Cocaine connected with Jackson's death

EL PASO (AP) — A woman was arrested Wednesday on charges of delivering cocaine in connection with the sudden death of Texas-El Paso basketball star Hermal "Jeep" Jackson, authorities said.

Michelle Lee Cabrera, 19, of El Paso, was arrested at her home Wednesday and charged with delivery of a controlled substance, cocaine under 28 grams, city police Lt. J.R. Grijalva said. Bond was set at \$500,000.

"There's a possibility of further arrests," said Grijalva. "I can't go into that, the investigation is ongoing."

Grijalva said he didn't know if Ms. Cabrera was a UTEP student, but her name was not listed in the 1986-87 UTEP student and faculty directory.

Jackson, 23, a first-team All-Western Athletic Conference player, died suddenly Saturday during a charity basketball game. A preliminary autopsy Sunday was inconclusive.

Ms. Cabrera was arrested by members of the police Special Investigations Group, which includes officers from vice, narcotics, intelligence and other specialized units in the department.

The probe began because of information received by police, though Grijalva would not comment on the nature of the information.

Jackson had joined Houston Oilers football players for a game Friday at the Fort Bliss military reservation. After playing for five minutes in the second half, he sat on a bench and collapsed shortly before 11 p.m. He was declared dead at a prominent Army Medical Center at 11 p.m.

There were "no visible signs of damage to the heart that was seen with the naked eye," said Diaz, chief investigator for the El Paso County medical examiner's office; said after a three-hour autopsy Sunday.

Samples of blood, urine and other body fluids were being processed but those tests were not expected next week, Grijalva said.

Diaz, UTEP officials and Jackson's father, Mason Jackson, of San Diego, Calif., have said the young man was in perfect health. A memorial service was held at the Special Investigations Center on the university Tuesday.

District Attorney Steve Sorenson did not return a call from The Associated Press.

SuperSonics 2-0 margin puts Rockets in the hole

SEATTLE (AP) — Houston Rockets Coach Bill Fitch is pessimistic about his team's chances of coming back against the surprising Seattle SuperSonics, and history says he has every right to be worried.

"Definitely, they are putting the dirt in our face," Fitch said. "We're either all through or it's just starting. It doesn't look good."

The Sonics will try to make it six straight playoff victories — and take a 3-0 lead over the Rockets — in the teams' Western Conference semifinal series tonight in the Seattle Coliseum.

Seattle won the first game on Sunday in Houston 111-106 in overtime and prevailed 99-97 Tuesday night.

Only four teams in NBA history have come back from a 2-0 deficit to win a best-of-seven series. The only team to lose the first two games at home and win a series was the Los Angeles Lakers against San Francisco in 1969.

If the Sonics win game three, they could close out the Rockets Saturday afternoon in Seattle.

"We want our fans rocking and hanging from the rafters," said Sonics Coach Bernie Bickerstaff. "We're amazed to have won two games in Houston, but we did."

However, Bickerstaff isn't making any claims about a series sweep, pointing out that the Rockets could win two games in Seattle as well.

They were underdogs in Dallas, but took the Mavericks a best-of-five opening-round series.

Seattle's five wins in a row in the playoffs are the team's longest winning streak of the season. The longest winning streak in the franchise's 20-year history, although the Sonics won the NBA championship in 1979.

The Sonics beat Dallas in their first game in Houston Tuesday night despite the arrival of starting center Alton Lister. Dale Ellis and reserve Kevin Williams who were involved in a club altercation.

Ellis poured in a game-high 39 points in game two and he used his arrest as additional motivation.

"I'd love to sweep the Rockets," said Bickerstaff. "Sweeping would be sweeter because of the incident."

The Sonics got Lister back on the court Tuesday night and played 16 minutes. He made Seattle's final seven regular-season games and its first five playoff tests with a broken bone in his foot.

Hough goes distance as Rangers rip Indians

ARLINGTON (AP) — Pete Inca-viglia, Larry Parrish and Pete O'Brien hit home runs and Charlie Hough allowed eight hits as the Texas Rangers beat the Cleveland Indians 7-2 Wednesday night in a battle of veteran knuckleballers.

Hough, 2-1, went the distance for the second time this season, striking out six and walking no one in beating the Indians for the ninth straight time.

The two Cleveland runs were unearned.

All the home runs came off 48-year-old Phil Niekro, 2-1, who allowed all the Texas runs and nine hits in 7 1/3 innings.

The Indians took a 2-0 lead in the first inning on a one-out single by Brett Butler, first baseman O'Brien's two-base fielding error on Franco's grounder, an RBI out by Joe Carter and an RBI out by Mel Hall.

The Rangers got three at-bats in the inning on Inca-viglia's fifth home run of the season, which is tops in the American League, which followed one-out singles by Oddibe McDowell and O'Brien.

Parrish's two-run homer in the fourth, his sixth of the year, 5-2 and O'Brien hit a solo shot in the fifth inning, his fourth homer.

Parrish singled home the Rangers' final run in the eighth.

Hough became Texas' all-time leader in innings pitched with Fergie Jenkins had 1,410.
