

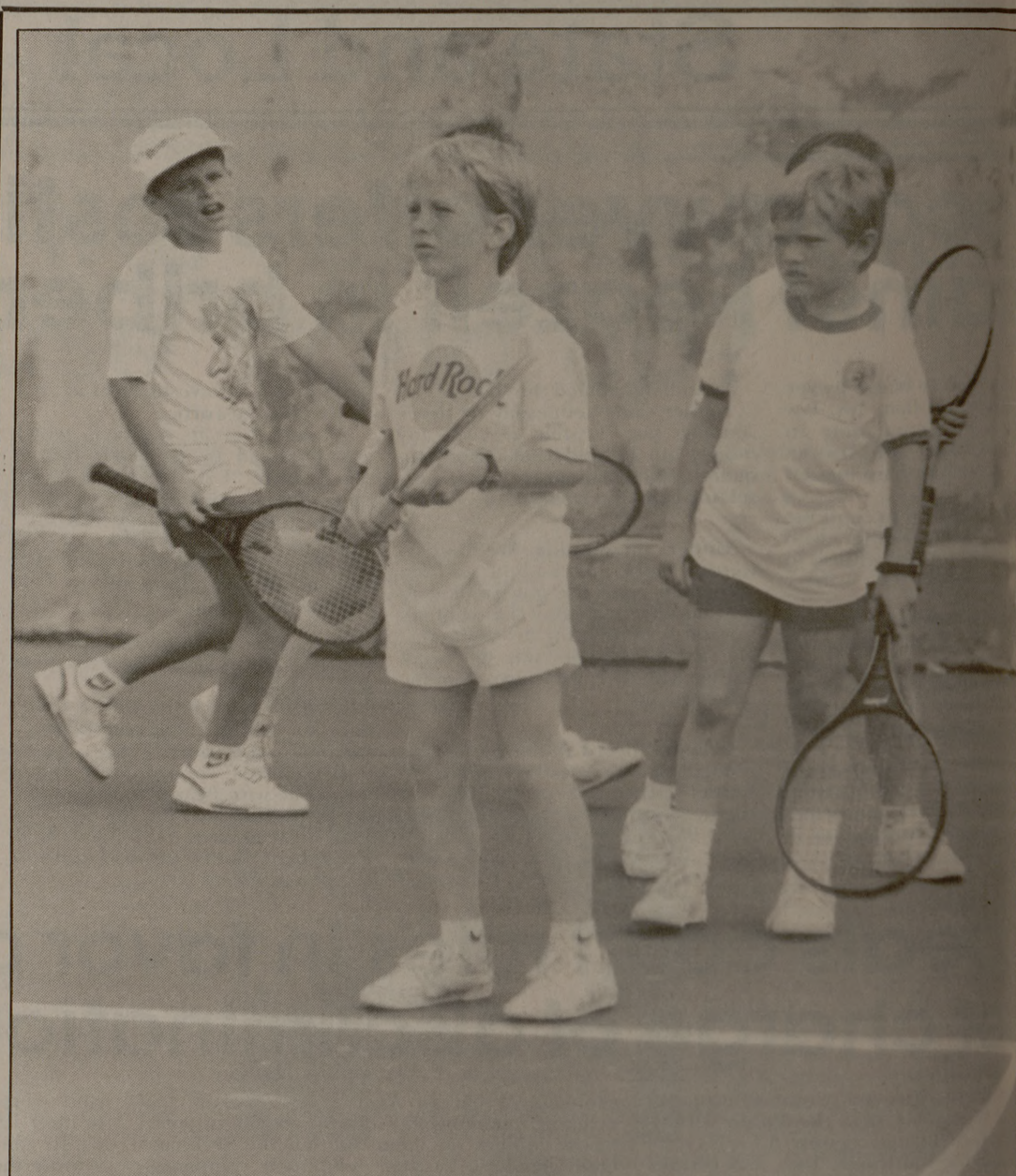

San Antonio lawmaker says judges should resign posts

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clements and the state legislator who led an investigation of the Texas Supreme Court last year called Wednesday for the resignations of the two justices who were officially rebuked this week.

If Justices C.L. Ray and William Kilgarlin don't step down, impeachment proceedings should be studied, said Sen. Frank Tejada, D-San Antonio.

"The two justices . . . should recognize that they can no longer function effectively on the court, and I am calling on them to submit their resignations," Tejada told a news conference.

"Should they be impeached?" he asked. "I would not discount that at all. And certainly, that is a question for the Legislature to determine."

Clements press secretary Reggie Bashur said Wednesday that the governor, too, believes the two justices should resign.

Clements "believes in integrity, and credibility must be restored to the state judicial system," Bashur said. "The governor has called for such reform for a long time and supports the thrust of reforms proposed by Sen. Frank Tejada."

As a state representative in 1986, Tejada chaired the House Judicial Affairs Committee that investigated alleged improprieties by Ray and Kilgarlin.

Information brought out in that probe was mentioned Tuesday when the State Commission on Judicial Conduct issued a public reprimand of Ray for seven violations of ethical rules. The panel also issued a public admonishment of Kilgarlin on two points.

Although Kilgarlin's rebuke was less serious than Ray's, Tejada said both sanctions — the commission's

"I've never seen too many politicians that weren't interested in some publicity," Wood said. "I believe this one is about as extreme as I've ever seen. I think he'll ever want to quit the publicity."

Wood said if the violations were serious enough to get the judge off the bench, the commission has power to do so. It didn't, and the case should end, he said.

Tejada said he has asked the legislative Council for a written report on impeachment.

House Speaker Gib Lewis whose chamber impeachment proceedings would have to begin, he hadn't considered that and really have not even had a chance to think about that," Lewis said.

The justices' lawyer said he has no grounds for impeachment.

"If the commission thought they would have sought reprimand," Wood said.

Tejada also said he is asking Bill Clements to include judicial reform in the June 22 special legislative session that will be complete action on a state budget.

He said he will ask the Bexar County district attorney and the attorney to look into the case for possible criminal wrongdoing, he urged the judicial commission to make public in the Ray and Kilgarlin.

Tejada also urged Clements to sign into law legislation that would make public the commission records in cases where a judge receives a public rebuke.

Tejada urged Chief Justice John L. Hill to join him in asking the two justices to step down.

Austin lawyer Randall "Buck" Wood, who represents both Ray and Kilgarlin, said Tejada's charges were ridiculous and politically motivated.
