Students hurl firebombs at police in South Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Students poured off campuses to fight riot police with rocks and firebombs Monday and thousands of people marched from a church through the capital, chanting "Rise up! Rise up!"

Students fought police in at least eight other cities in the sustained and violent campaign against President Chun Doo-hwan's authoritarian government that began last Wednesday.

Protesters trapped and beat a unit of 43 officers in Yongin, south of Seoul.

Attacks on and beatings of police have become commonplace since the protests began last week to coincide with a convention of Chun's ruling Democratic Justice Party that endorsed his choice of fellow ex-general Roh Tae-woo to succeed him as president next February.

Critics of the government demand democratic reforms including direct presidential elections, which Chun has refused. He says his successor should be chosen under the existing electoral college system, which opponents say favors the incumbent party.

A new coalition of political, religious and human rights leaders with the announced purpose of rallying the "power of the masses" against the government called for the current nationwide campaign of protest.

Scores of people were injured Monday in Seoul and many others were seen being arrested. Officials would not provide casualty or arrest figures for the capital or other cities.

Huge demonstrations continued around the Roman Catholic Dongdong Cathedral in downtown Seoul. Thousands of people gathered again and again throughout the day to denounce the government, though riot police drove them repeatedly with tear gas or clubs.

More than 10,000 people, including many families, attended a special Mass to pray for the salvation, then marched in the streets with lighted candles in front of riot police.

"Rise up!" they chanted, protesting against police lines.

Cardinal Stephen Kim Su-hwan, leader of the Catholic Church in South Korea, appealed for democracy and reform.

Earlier Monday, priests went out an agreement with officials to end an occupation by students who had held the cathedral campus since protests began last Wednesday. The priests and about 200 students rode out in five buses.

Some of the worst clashes in Seoul were Pusan, a southern port where about 10,000 students were held police through clouds of gas.

Court shuns Deaver's appeal to dismiss perjury indictment

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal appellate court ruled Monday that lobbyist Michael K. Deaver must stand trial on perjury charges, refusing to accept his appeal of a pretrial ruling in the case.

The U.S. Court of Appeals ruled that Deaver could not appeal the trial judge's denial of his motion to dismiss the indictment on the ground that independent counsel Whitney North Seymour Jr. had no authority to prosecute the case.

Lawyers for Deaver, a former top aide to Reagan, said in advance of Monday's decision that they planned to take any adverse ruling to Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist. Consideration of such an appeal by Rehnquist or the full Supreme Court could further delay the start of a trial.

Deaver had sought to have the appellate court rule on his challenge to the constitutionality of the Ethics in Government Act, which provides for judicial appointment of independent counsels.

But the court refused to accept Deaver's appeal of U.S. District Judge Thomas Penfield Jackson's decision, saying the lower court's ruling "is not a final order, and therefore is unappealable."

"We find no reason to make an exception in this case," the court said in the order for Judges Harry Edwards, James Buckley and Stephen Williams.

Deaver, who resigned as deputy White House chief of staff in 1985, is charged with five counts of lying to a House subcommittee and a federal grand jury that investigated his lobbying business for possible ethics violations.

The trial had originally been scheduled to begin June

8, but Deaver's appeal forced a postponement while the issue was being considered in the appeals court.

Normally, pretrial rulings by judges are not appealable. But Deaver, arguing the serious nature of the constitutional challenge, contended that the court should make an exception to this procedural rule.

The appeals court also rejected Deaver's request to issue a so-called mandamus order to Jackson, directing him to reconsider his pretrial ruling.

"Mandamus is an extraordinary remedy to be invoked only in drastic circumstances," the court said. "There are no such extraordinary circumstances presented here."

The ruling marks the second time in a week that appeals court has sidestepped constitutional questions to the ethics law.

Last week, it sent a similar challenge by Lt. Gen. Oliver North back to U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. with instructions to rule on the case without tiding constitutional issues.

The former National Security Council aide is challenging the authority of independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh to force him to give a sample of his handwriting to the grand jury investigating the Iran-Contra affair.

In that case, the court ruled that Robinson had erred by holding North in contempt of court for refusing to obey the subpoena without first considering his challenge to Walsh's authority.

The major difference in the North case is that Walsh, unlike Seymour, accepted a parallel appointment as special prosecutor from the Justice Department.
