11-year-old Texan attempting to fly from coast to coast

LOS ANGELES (AP) — An 11-year-old boy settled onto two pillows so he could see out the window and took to the sky Wednesday in a bid to become the youngest person to pilot a plane across the United States.

"It's not a big deal to me," said John Kevin Hill, who has had 150 hours of flying experience and hopes to fly around the world two years from now. "I'm used to flying long distances."

"It's something to do for the summer."

"It's very hard to take off from here because there's a lot of traffic," he said, remarking that he would have to rely on instruments rather than control-tower radar because Whiteman has no tower.

"I'm a little nervous," he had said Tuesday. "Well, I guess I'm excited and nervous."

He was confident, he said, because "I'm better than most pilots."

Morning fog burned off in time for the Arlington, Texas, boy's take-off in a single-engine Cessna 210 from Whiteman Air Park in suburban Pacoima en route to his first stop at Cedar City, Utah.

Hill has a stopover Friday in Loveland, Colo., north of Denver. Then, it's on to Kansas City, Mo., and St. Louis for a stop Sunday. On July 1, Hill is scheduled to reach Washington, D.C.

Dressed in jeans, a "Texas" T-shirt, tennis shoes and a ball cap with his name on it, Hill was accompanied by flight instructor Mike Fields and a newspaper reporter.

Hill claims self-defense in the shooting of a fellow officer, the city's personnel director said.

Farrell Tucker, 36, was acquitted in the Aug. 18 shooting death of his best friend, Stephen R. Smith, 31.

Because Hill's not old enough to obtain a solo pilot's license, Fields is a required companion on the week-long, 3,500-mile trip. Fields, who will take the controls only in an emergency, has been Hill's instructor since the boy started flying at age 9.

Tucker claims self-defense in the shooting of Smith, a suspected vigilante cop who Tucker said planned to kill three top law enforcement officials.

Hill's longest previous flight was a 7,000-mile trek with Fields across the northwest United States and Canada last year.

Joe Constantino, city personnel director, said Tuesday that Tucker's case doesn't come under a provision calling for his entire disciplinary record to be reviewed before allowing him back on the job.

The journey could get Hill's name etched in the Guinness Book of World Records, which lists a 9-year-old for setting a record in 1983 with a solo flight over Mexico. But there is no entry for the youngest pilot to fly across the United States.

Constantino said under those guidelines, it would seem Chief William O. Gibson probably has little choice but to allow Tucker back on the force.

Hill found the sky over Los Angeles crowded.

At a sendoff Monday in Arlington, about 200 well-wishers gathered to see Hill off. The Texas Rangers gave him an autographed baseball and the Dallas Cowboys gave him an autographed football.

Patrolman acquitted of murdering friend may get old job back

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A patrolman acquitted of murder could get his job back unless officials find he broke departmental rules in shooting a fellow officer, the city's personnel director said.

San Antonio City Attorney J. Garza said he will continue to search for Gibson.

Farrell Tucker, 36, was acquitted in the Aug. 18 shooting death of his best friend, Stephen R. Smith, 31.

Tucker claims self-defense in the shooting of Smith, a suspected vigilante cop who Tucker said planned to kill three top law enforcement officials.

"We are plotting a lot of ground," Garza said. "That's not taking so long. We don't have precedent to deal with."

Joe Constantino, city personnel director, said Tuesday that Tucker's case doesn't come under a provision calling for his entire disciplinary record to be reviewed before allowing him back on the job.

State law gives city officials 30 days to decide whether Tucker be reinstated.

Constantino said under those guidelines, it would seem Chief William O. Gibson probably has little choice but to allow Tucker back on the force.

"We don't want to wait that long but we still want to direct time to it so we're all coming with the outcome," Garza said.

Gibson said Tuesday, "There not yet been identified an reason why Officer Tucker not be put back to work."

If Gibson doesn't make a decision within the 30 days, Tucker will be reinstated automatically, Constantino said.

Wife confirms testimony of husband as McFadden murder trial continues

BELTON (AP) — A woman confirmed her husband's testimony Wednesday that a teenager was in a car similar to one driven by Jerry "Animal" McFadden the day the youth and two others were seen alive for the last time.

Authorities found the bodies of Turner, 20, and 19-year-old Boone 10 days later. McFadden has not been charged in those deaths.

Lavita Pace Boykin of Lake Hawkins told jurors in McFadden's murder trial that she saw Bryan Boone of Hawkins, who went with Suzanne Harrison and Gena Turner on a weekend outing in May 1986.

Boykin, 20, told jurors that her husband said, "Hey, look; there's Bryan." I slightly turned my head and said, 'Yes, it sure is.'"

Her husband, Gregory, gave similar testimony Tuesday.

But defense attorney Vernard Solomon, in cross-examination, asked Boykin if she remembered telling police in a June 1986 statement, "We did not wave at Bryan or anything."

McFadden is accused in the beating-strangulation death of Harrison, 18, whose partially clothed body was found the day after she disappeared from Lake Hawkins.

Boykin said in the third day of testimony she now remembers that her husband waved at the teen-ager who was sitting in a blue-and-white Bronco similar to one McFadden was driving.

Huntsville (AP) — A convicted killer whose drug use made it difficult for prison officials to administer a lethal injection was executed quietly early Wednesday for the 1982 robbery-slaying of a Beaumont jeweler.

Two other witnesses testified they saw a blue-and-white Bronco traveling on a road about three miles from Lake Hawkins.

Elliot Rod Johnson, 28, of Port Arthur, asked for forgiveness while family members of his victim waited across the street from the Texas Department of Corrections Walls Unit to assure themselves the execution had occurred.

Although Johnson was brought to the death chamber shortly after midnight, it wasn't until 12:43 a.m. that the lethal drugs began flowing through his veins. Death came 12 minutes later, Attorney General Jim Mattox said.

"I'm very sorry for bringing all the hurt and pain to everyone who loved me so much," Johnson said in his final statement. "I hope all my friends find it in their hearts to forgive me."

Johnson, a 10th-grade dropout who also dropped out of the Army because he couldn't cope with military life, insisted he was not in the store at the time of the shooting. State and federal courts Tuesday rejected his final appeals.

Johnson was killed for the shooting death of Joseph Granado, 67, and a fellow employee at his downtown Beaumont store, Arturo Melendez, 45. The two were gunned

down during a daylight robbery on April 8, 1982.

Johnson and another man, Maurice Andrews, were sentenced to death for the Granado slaying. An execution date has not been set for Andrews. A third man received a life prison term and a fourth got 30 years.

Harrison's mother, Mary Ann Harris, sobbed Tuesday as she recalled the death of her daughter.

Clutching a handkerchief, Harrison sobs her daughter would have graduated honors three weeks after she was killed.

She gave a list of student activities her daughter participated in and said she had accepted at Texas A&M University.

Harrison said her daughter spent the night at Turner's house the day before she was killed and then spent most of May 4, 1986, with her.

Later that evening, Turner and Boone Harrison up at about 6 p.m. and said they not be out past 7 p.m., Harrison said. She said it was the last time she saw her daughter.

Convicted killer executed by lethal injection

About four hours before the execution, Johnson made a phone call to his mother, Luanna, who had just begun serving a six-month prison term for theft.

Johnson, whose record included two drug convictions, said he was the three others convicted of Granado slaying drove to Beaumont on April 8, 1982, to buy some beer but he was ill and waited outside.

Testimony at his trial, which placed him inside the store with Granado and Melendez, was in execution-style. A jury took 10 minutes to convict him.

Johnson was the fourth inmate to be executed this year — the 24th — more than in any state — since the state resumed executions in 1982.
