Chairman says impeachment not topic yet

AUSTIN (AP) — The chairman of the House State Affairs Committee, where a resolution to form a special impeachment inquiry of Gov. Bill Clements has been referred, indicated Monday that there are no plans to soon consider the proposal.

Rep. Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, presided over a committee meeting that heard testimony on several bills. However, Laney cautioned the audience, "If you're here for that purpose (the impeachment study resolution) . . . rest assured it will not be taken up today."

Reps. Paul Moreno, D-El Paso, and Al Edwards, D-Houston, introduced the resolution to begin a study of whether impeachment proceedings should take place in light of the latest revelations in the Southern Methodist University football scandal.

A new report prepared by Methodist bishops said Clements, as former chairman of the SMU board of governors, participated in a plan to continue cash payments to football players in violation of NCAA rules and later took part in an effort to cover up the payments.

Clements, a Republican, has branded the impeachment inquiry proposal as partisan politics. House Speaker Gib Lewis and Laney have said they aren't eager to take action on the resolution, noting that SMU is a private school and Clements wasn't in public office at the time.

Senate passes priority system for state's bills

AUSTIN (AP) — The Senate passed legislation Monday that would establish priorities for paying the state's bills in case of a cash-flow crisis.

By a 24-0 vote, the senators set the measure to the House for consideration. "We set up a more responsible order of distribution," said Sen. Grant Jones, D-Temple, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee.

Current law requires the state treasurer to continue issuing warrants for valid appropriations even if no funds are available.

Local comedy group provides B-CS with freshness, entertainment variety

In the last three or four years the club scene in Bryan-College Station has grown from a non-existent state to the nearly healthy form it now sports.

Most of the entertainment available via this club scene is musically oriented, whether it be in the form of live bands or disc-jockeys. One form of entertainment that has not shared in this growth, however, is comedy.

Deranged Durang, a local improvisational group, is trying to change that. Deranged Durang was created six months ago by Drue Franklin, who had two basic goals in mind. First, he wanted to establish improvisational comedy as an entertainment alternative for local club patrons, and second, he wanted to provide a learning experience for the members of Deranged Durang.

The group, somewhat surprised with the success of its first two performances, made plans to continue through at least the end of this year.

Current members of the group are Shot Smith, Robbie Taylor, Deena Elliott, Jonathan Burke, Emma Reading, Lisa Maduro and Jennifer Hargis. Dan Kehoe retired as a performing member after the latest performance, while Donna Copeland is the group's technician.

The members come from a variety of backgrounds, but most have previous experience in the theater arts.

Smith, the current group director, says Deranged Durang would like to attend comedy workshops in Austin and perform there. Eventually, he would like to see the group reach a point at which they could give their

own comedy workshops here. The audience plays a big role in each show and the success of an evening's performance often depends on crowd input. Several of the skits are designed to take suggestions from the audience and incorporate them into the act.

Creative input for the skits comes from every member of the group. The skits constantly are changed and rearranged while some are dropped altogether. Smith says that no two shows are similar.

Problems have surfaced in the past when the troupe has done warm-ups for musical performers. "The whole crowd is there to see a band and they are not there to be entertained by comedy," Smith says.

The troupe's latest performance was Wednesday at Eastgate Live. The highly energetic performance was certainly a refreshing change from the usual assortment of musical bands that have played in town. The show lasted approximately two hours and moved at an extremely rapid pace.
