## National Guard, extra firefighters help battle blazes

(AP) — National Guardsmen were called out Wednesday and firefighters flew in from around the nation to help weary crews battling fires in four Western states that blackened 137,000 acres and forced some people to flee their homes.

Some fires went unattended because fire crews were needed elsewhere. Dense smoke from some fires kept aircraft from being used to drop water.

More than 300 California National Guardsmen were summoned to help in hard-hit Tuolumne County, along with aircraft and 90 trucks, Guard spokesman Sgt. Carolyn Hamilton said.

Lightning-spawned fires since Sunday had charred 89,115 acres of brush and timber in northern California, swelling by 20,000 acres in less than 24 hours.

"There are now 910 fires going," John Carter said at the joint state-federal fire information center in Sacramento, Calif. "We have 11,000 people fighting the fires."

It is the worst onslaught in California since the lightning-plagued summer of 1977, when the Marble-Cone fire in the Los Padres National Forest blackened nearly 200,000 acres, according to fire officials.

Oregon had more than 600 fires, charring at least 31,000 acres.

The biggest single fire, in the central Idaho mountains, was a 32-day-old, 15,000-acre blaze being allowed to burn in extremely rugged terrain inside a wilderness area. Firefighters at Pocatello, Idaho, were close to containing a fire that destroyed one house and threatened others on the outskirts of the city.

Southern California has had more than 30 fires, and arson was suspected in at least three cases. One fire in Washington forced evacuation of campers in a nearby park.

Firefighters from several states were on their way to join the battle against the Oregon fires, including crews from Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Tennessee and the North Carolina.

At least eight houses had been destroyed.

Ron DeHart of the Salem-Oregon Unified Coordinating Group, which coordinates state and federal efforts, said, "We would ultimately have to characterize the situation in southwest Oregon as blowup state today. It does not look good. We were really hoping for a mistake in the forecast that called some winds..."

Otherwise, we're doing an eyeball-to-flames test off."

DeHart said 3,200 firefighters were battling the blazes, with an arriving hourly from the East. Crews remained short-handed because larger fires in California given priority.

Officials said 25 houses were evacuated from Takilma on the edge of the Siskiyou National Forest, with some residents in the Siskiyou Creek and Savage Creek areas of the town of Rogue River. The Siskiyou and North Myrtle areas of Roseburg, Ore., were ordered evacuated, the U.S. Forest Service said.

Mike Milosch of the U.S. Forest Service said the hottest spot in California was in the southern Stanislaus National Forest, in the Sierra Nevada east of San Francisco, where three uncontrolled fires of 3,000, 4,000 acres each that burned house, a mobile home and lookout stations.

Outside that forest, about 2,000-acre fire came to within a mile of town.

Washington (AP) — The nation's fertility rate fell to a record low last year, while life expectancy reached a record high and marriage and divorce rates dipped to the lowest levels in a decade, the government reported Wednesday.

Average life expectancy "in 1986 reached a new record high of 74.9 years," the Center for Health Statistics, an arm of the Department of Health and Human Services said. That was up from 74.7 years reported in 1985.

The highest life expectancy was 78.9 years for white females, up from 78.7 a year earlier. White males saw an increase from 71.8 to 72.0 years.

Black life expectancy rose from 65.3 to 65.5 years for men, but declined from 73.7 to 73.6 years for women, the center's annual summary of vital statistics reported.

Births totaled 3,731,000, down 18,000 from 1985.

That represented 64.9 live births per 1,000 women aged 15 to 44, 2 percent below last year and the lowest rate ever recorded in the United States, the report said.

The drop reflects the trend of recent years, as many young people have postponed marriage and families to pursue education and careers.

Social scientists have debated in recent years whether this represents merely a delay in having children or a decision not to have families. Only time will disclose the answer as the children of the post-World War II Baby Boom pass through their prime childbearing years.

Trends in the number of annual births are affected by two factors, the rate of births among women and the number of women in the childbearing ages.

The number of women aged 15 to 44 increased 1 percent between 1985 and 1986, but the bulk of that was among women aged 30 and over, where birth rates tend to be lower. The number of women aged 15 to 29 declined by 1 percent.

The Census Bureau has projected that the total number of women in the prime childbearing ages will remain substantially the same through the remainder of this decade.

But their age structure is expected to shift more toward the older segment of that group, as the smaller group of women born in the late 1960s and early 1970s matures.

Thus, unless declines in total births are to begin occurring, birth rates will have to rise among these women.

Turning to marriages, the center reported 2,400,000 in 1986, down about 25,000 from 1985.

That's a national marriage rate of 10.0 per 1,000 people, down from 10.2 a year earlier and the lowest rate since 1977, when it was 9.9.

after World War II, when 16.4 marriages per 1,000 people were recorded in 1946. The bottom was the Depression year of 1932 at 7.1.

There were 1,159,000 divorces last year, down from 1,187,000 in 1985. That's a drop from 5.0 divorces per 1,000 people to 4.8.

This was the lowest divorce rate since 1975, when it was also 4.8.

WASHINGTON (AP) — California's proposal to host the federal government's prized "super collider" project arrived at the Energy Department with just eight minutes to spare Wednesday after a relative dispute threatened to scuttle the submission.

The state's proposal arrived with confusion over whether an early California submission was valid or whether anything submitted by the state would count. In the end, officials said the California legislature's failure to approve an associated bond issue didn't matter now.

Also, New York officials revealed that they had offered four sites, three as they announced on Tuesday.

The fourth site would straddle the U.S.-Canadian border, a location ruled out by the department's requirement that the site be entirely within the United States. New York officials said they submitted it anyway on the half of the Canadian province of Quebec, which prepared it.

Gov. Mario Cuomo has written Energy Secretary John Herrington to encourage "possible reconsideration of the criteria." But department spokesman Phil Keif said, "The still in the criteria. It has to be entirely in the United States."

The department had earlier ruled out partially foreign sites as unfriendly states not having a potential foreign partner adjacent to them.

In addition to California, other states — North Carolina, Idaho, Michigan and Alaska turned in their proposals Wednesday, bringing to 25 the number of states competing to land the \$4.4-billion research installation and 3,000 non-polluting jobs.
