Mavs' Tarpley sought counseling in summer for unnamed problem

DALLAS (AP) — Dallas Mav-ericks forward Roy Tarpley said Wednesday he was counseled this summer for a problem he didn't identify but has been resolved.

"I don't want people saying, 'Another one bites the dust,' " Tarpley said in a statement re-leased by the Mavericks. "I learn from my mistakes.'

The Dallas Times Herald, in a story published Wednesday, quoted two sources who said the problems were related to drug and alcohol use. A third unidentified source contradicted that re-

Tarpley said he sought help because he didn't want to become another statistic.

"I sought professional counsel-ing. I felt like I had a potential problem," he said in the statement. "I felt like it could get out of hand. But it's been resolved. It's over with.

Tarpley, the Mavericks' No. 1 draft pick in 1986 and a member of the NBA's All-Rookie team last season, said he told team vice president Rick Sund after the sea-
