

Crews get reprieve as cooler weather helps calm blazes

(AP) — Crews battling forest fires that have charred an estimated 980 square miles in the West got help Sunday from calm, cooler weather after the smoke was blamed for two aviation near-collisions, and the last evacuees were allowed to return home in Oregon.

A second firefighter was killed in California, this one by a falling tree.

Some fires in remote areas were being allowed to burn, partly because of a shortage of trained firefighters. No damage estimate was available for California, but Oregon officials estimated statewide damage at \$318 million, mostly in timber loss.

In addition to prime timber, officials said the blazes also were destroying illegal marijuana crops hidden in the forests.

"We've basically used up all the firefighting resources in the nation," Jim Torrence, regional forester for the U.S. Forest Service, said at a news conference Sunday in Oregon.

The total burned area in California grew to more than 475,000 acres since Aug. 28 and 107,000 acres have gone up in smoke in Oregon. About 35,000 acres have burned in Idaho, and smaller fires were reported last week in Washington, Arizona, Montana, South Dakota and Wyoming, bringing the total acreage to about 629,000.

The burned area is only 72 square miles smaller than the state of Rhode Island.

Fires in Oregon and California were being fought by 22,000 firefighters, up 2,000 from Saturday, according to the Boise Interagency Fire Center in Idaho, which coordinates state and federal crews. It said they were fighting 1,844 fires, down from Saturday's 1,877.

Smoke and haze from the fires had reduced visibility to one-quarter mile late Saturday when a private plane and a four-engine Pacific Southwest Airlines jet came within 200 feet of each other, said Jeremy

James, a spokesman for the Diego-based airline.

The jet, carrying 27 passengers had to take evasive action 20 miles southeast of Oakland, James said. No injuries or damage were reported. The Federal Aviation Administration was investigating the crash.

Earlier Saturday, the pilot of a single-engine Cessna 150 flying east of Salinas reported the plane was dangerously close to another because of the smoke, according to the National Weather Service in Redwood City.

A spokesman for the FAA said the pilot had not filed a "near-miss" report.

Sunday was the third straight day of favorable weather in California and crews were making headway against the state's worst blazes, including the 119,000-acre Stambaugh Complex fire in the Stanislaus National Forest just west of Yosemite National Park, a spokesman said. Officials said it no longer threatened the Merced Grove of rare redwoods in the park.

LoVae Pray Martines, an assistant officer for the California Department of Forestry, said around the corner. We're going to get containment on our top six priority fires."

She said the Paper Complex had destroyed enough timber to build 10,000 three-bedroom houses.

One firefighter was killed Sunday and nine others were injured seriously, when a four-foot-diameter tree fell on their truck at Rivers National Forest about 10 miles north of San Francisco. A tree was in a fire area but was burned or dead, Martines said. The second firefighter died since Aug. 28.

Fire officials said an attempt to prevent the huge Paper Complex blaze, about 150 miles southeast of San Francisco, from spreading to towns east of Sonora was partially thwarted by the fire 20 percent Sunday.

Attorney's office says professionals avoid paying back loans

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — Too often, their ranks include the professionals — doctors, lawyers, educators, government workers and even legislators.

With a disdain for their legal obligations, they willingly take the money to obtain the college degree needed to start their careers and then turn their backs, leaving less for others barred from university campuses because of finances.

This is the picture the state attorney general's office paints of many of the 20,000 people who have quit paying back their loans for higher education.

Often, it's not a matter of who can't pay.

"To be perfectly honest with you, it's the people who won't pay," Mae Wyatt, collections coordinator for the attorney general's office, says.

For some of those who haven't paid, the anticipation of receiving a state income tax refund proved to be a bit premature this year.

Acting under a 1982 law, the attorney general's office seized \$307,000 from those in default with student loans.

A law that goes into effect this fall will allow the state to refuse occupational licenses to those who have

failed to pay or make arrangements to pay their loans.

Wyatt said that when the default rate is high, the federal government trims back the amount of money made available to state universities through the Student Loan Program.

Wyatt blamed the economic downturn of the problem, but in terms of people being unable to pay the loans. Many who obtain degrees in Louisiana leave the state for jobs in economic boom areas, ignoring their agreement to repay.

However, authorities are getting a foothold against the flood of due notes, Wyatt said.

According to Attorney General William Guste, his office has about 20,000 delinquent accounts, 18,000 of which are the target of lawsuits or court-ordered judgments.

The other 2,000 are followed through with regular payments.

Since 1982, the state has received \$715,000 through garnishments, income tax refunds and the attorney general's office has recovered \$10 million from delinquent student accounts, Guste said.
