Latin Americans see economy rise but income drops

WASHINGTON (AP) — Latin America is slowly coming out of the deep economic slump of the early 1980s but income in some countries — notably Mexico — dropped sharply last year, the Inter-American Development Bank said Monday.

"Only three countries — Brazil, Colombia, Panama — had a higher (average income) in 1986 than in 1980, while 13 had a loss of at least 10 percent," the bank said in its annual report.

During 1986, average income for people in the region rose by 1.4 percent to \$2,140 a year, about the same rate of increase as the previous two years. The lowest annual income of \$342 — less than a dollar a day — was in Haiti. The highest was \$7,884 in the Bahamas.

The bank, financed largely by the United States, is a major source of loans for the poor countries of the hemisphere.

In March, Latin American members rejected a chance to more than double the bank's lending power, from the present projection of \$10 billion to \$22.5 billion. The additional money would have been accompanied by a new arrangement that would have given the United States and Canada what amounted to a joint veto over new loans.

"Up to now there has been a surprising degree of public tolerance in the face of unemployment, reduction of social services and the drop in real incomes of the population," the bank said.

"Deep social conflicts have been

arising in some countries. The restoration of economic growth could reduce the violence and in such conflicts."

The report showed that Mexico, where the government of President Miguel de La Madrid has accumulated a record \$14.6 billion in reserves, average income dropped last year by 6.4 percent, a continuation by 4.6 percent and more by 11.7 percent. The average can earned \$2,407 last year, from \$2,734 in 1980.

Other countries did better. Peru, which has been hit by the drop in world oil prices, saw its average income rise by more than 4 percent after a 6 percent in 1985.

Brazil, which accounts for a part of South America's economic increase, saw its production by the usually high rate of 8.2 percent the third year in a row. But it also was troubled by a resurgence of inflation.

Peru increased its production even more than Brazil — by 8.2 percent — in part by cutting payments on its foreign debt, another source of inflation.

Inflation in Lima, the capital, hit 77.9 percent, but that was less than half what it was the year before. Colombia had a good year, increasing its total production by 5.2 percent in seven years. The report said the rise was mainly to an increase in prices. It does not take into account Colombia's other big drug, cocaine and marijuana.

Firefighters continue war against blazes; more evacuees return

(AP) — Firefighters concentrated on 200 major forest fires still burning in the West and allowed more evacuees to return home Monday after containing hundreds of the blazes that had charred 1,000 square miles.

At least 3,000 people in California were still being kept from their homes because of fire danger.

"We had enough of a break in the weather that we were able to contain some of the smaller fires and medium size fires," assistant regional forester Ken Clark from Sacramento, Calif., said Monday on ABC's "Good Morning America."

"That enables us to shift some resources to those that are still uncontrolled," he said.

"It's still hot, dusty and dirty out there, but the winds aren't as erratic," he said.

Crews in Idaho brought a 10,500-acre blaze in the Sawtooth National Forest under control Monday, allowing most of a 600-man force to be reassigned to the huge fires still out of control in California and Oregon. One Idaho fire was allowed to continue burning in extremely rough terrain and a small fire was burning in Washington.

About 22,000 firefighters have battled the blazes and 600 Army soldiers were added to fire efforts in Oregon on Monday to take some mop-up chores. Three firefighters had been killed in accidents in California since training began setting the team on Aug. 28, and the Forest Service said 34 had been injured.

An estimated 496,800 acres have been charred by more than 100 fires in California as of Monday. In California, the damage is nearly 105,000 acres had gone up in smoke in Oregon.

Including about 30,000 acres burned in Idaho, plus smaller fires in Washington, Arizona, Montana, South Dakota and Wyoming, total estimated burned area was 636,000 acres.

Oregon officials estimated \$317 million, mostly in timber sources, with state firefighting running up to \$2 million a day.

In California, the damage is more than just one fire; the 100-acre Paper Complex blaze in Stanislaus National Forest, was 1.2 million.

California officials announced Monday that 2,000 people evacuated north of the Tuolumne River the Paper Complex fire had been allowed to return, leaving 3,000 people elsewhere in Tuolumne County.

Jerry Lewis Telethon raises record amount for charity

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — The 22nd annual Jerry Lewis Labor Day Telethon raised a record \$39,021,723 on Monday and workers tossed confetti as the entertainer declared the effort "a good day for mankind."

The show surpassed last year's record of \$34,096,773 by nearly \$5 million. A long list of corporate sponsors presented Lewis with an additional \$34,306,197 in pledges above the \$39 million raised across the United States and Canada.

Celebrities sang and danced through the 21.5-hour event and muscular dystrophy victims and their family members made poignant pleas for funds to help fight 12 different diseases and 24 neuromuscular disorders targeted by the New York-based Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Donations soared past last year's record in the 20th hour of the telethon, bringing cheers from a crowd jammed into a sports pavilion at Caesars Palace where the telethon was produced.

"As corny as it may sound, my God, what a good day for mankind," Lewis told a national audience.

One of the most touching moments came when Bob Sampson, former vice president of United Airlines, told of his long battle against the crippling disease.

"These lungs are going fast," the wheelchair-bound Sampson said in an emotional speech. "You don't die of muscular dystrophy, you die of pneumonia, or something else. If

not, ultimately you will die of emphysema. So they do a tracheotomy and put you on a respirator. You live six months."

"I don't want a respirator. I want to sit up and see what this world is like when it comes to get you."

Earlier in the show, Lewis' aide videotaped Jim Grigsby, a gas firefighter who helped lead a national program 25 years ago, which firefighters stand on shoulders, collecting donations in honor of MDA. Grigsby learned about the disease, and died earlier this year.

Lewis, who had attended Grigsby's funeral, was visibly shaken by the segment, and his voice broke when he continued the show.

Lewis, who spends half of his year working for MDA, has raised money for the New York-based Muscular Dystrophy Association. Lewis sought "one dollar more" for this year's telethon record. He set a year's budget for the association at \$100 million, with the money used for a variety of purposes including patient care and research.

Lewis' co-hosts included Davis Jr., Ed McMahon, Casey Kasem, Julius LaRosa and Tom Landry. Stars making appearances included Frank Sinatra, Ann-Margret, Tom Jones and Paul Anka.

The telethon has raised more than \$404 million. Additional money raised from corporate sports kiddie carnivals, has pushed the total raised for MDA to nearly \$1 billion.
