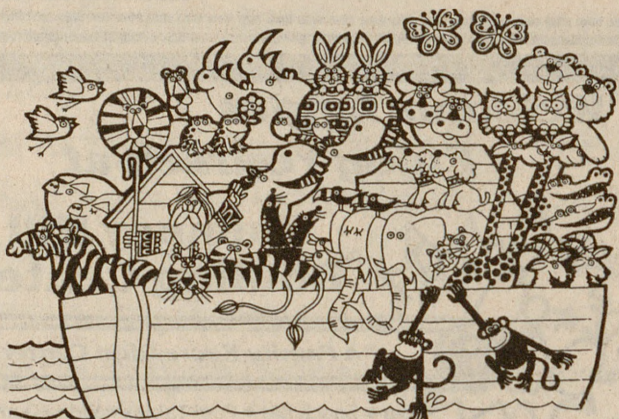

Arts committee experience dramatic membership rise

The MSC Literary Arts Committee has been caught up in the backlash of the liberal arts revolution — and they couldn't be happier.

"We're trying to take advantage of a good thing," Chris Pourteau, vice chairman of the committee, said. The MSC organization publishes the campus literary magazine, Litmus, which includes the works of Texas A&M writers, poets and artists. This year the club is aiming for a more open format.

Public relations director Peter Hughes reports a marked new interest in the organization this semester. "We have been a small group in the past," Hughes said, "but things are changing."

At the MSC Open House the committee had a record number of inquiries — primarily from freshmen, Hughes said.

At their first meeting Monday, the club doubled their membership. When asked to comment on the standing-room-only turnout, Hughes just smiled.

"It's just what I'd hoped for," he said.

The members of the arts committee feel a bigger membership will give the committee more color and diversity. The officers say they are interested in all types of writing and creative work.

The committee is not interested in just "Ernest Hemingway types," Hughes said.

In expanding the organization the committee is hoping to become involved in all areas of the campus.

"We want the campus to know we are striving to have a class literary magazine," Hughes said.

The club's enthusiasm is spilling over into other groups in the MSC — the group approached other organizations with similar backgrounds and network.

"Forming an alliance with other arts groups more of a goal," Hughes said. "We are expanding like we are benefit from more management and financial strength."

Houston group battles city law to regain right to skate on streets

HOUSTON (AP) — Members of a group called the "Urban Animals" say they're tired of skating around a 45-year-old law that subjects them to fines of up to \$200 for weaving through Houston's traffic-clogged streets.

Since at least 1942, Houston has had an ordinance prohibiting the use of "toy vehicles" — like skates and scooters — on city roadways.

"I don't consider my skates to be toys at all," skate mechanic Jim Sherman says. "I've got \$450 tied up in them as my main form of transportation."

"Technically we are breaking the law, and we'd like to see the law changed.

"All we're asking for is the same rights and consideration given the joggers and bicycles out there."

The law says those on "toy vehicles" must stay on sidewalks or crosswalks or face a possible ticket. The "Animals," however, say the law forces skaters into pedestrian traffic and fails to take into account areas without sidewalks.

Sherman and Montrose Skate Stop owner, John McKay, says the law was passed when skates were rickety, metal-wheeled, strap-on playthings, but they now are reliable, smooth-rolling transportation means.

At least one member of the city council, which could change the law, thinks no change is needed.

"I think it sounds like a very bad idea, basically for the safety of the skaters, the motorists and in our quest for mobility," Councilman Jim Greenwood said.

Greenwood noted skates, unlike bicycles, have no brakes and that the city might face increased legal liability and a higher standard for preventing bumpy roads and potholes if skaters are allowed in the streets.

Councilman George Harp urges a compromise to allow downtown streets at night.

"They've been doing this and no harm has been done," Harp said. "People who do what precautions to take."

Man builds fiberglass giant from abandoned statues

SHERMAN (AP) — Like Dr. Frankenstein before him, Glenn Goode, whose fiberglass giant look like kid brothers of the tall Big Tex of State Fair fame.

Building a giant with a hat, 120-inch waistline and shoes takes two men about 10 months, Goode said.

Goode's giant stands as high as Big Tex and does not look like the familiar "Howdy" Tex does sport a friendly permanent wave.

And Harp, who hopes it will attract attention to his blasting business, couldn't be pleased.

"It's going to be good for the city," he mused, brushing his Tex's shiny, black shoes.

"You drive down the road and see a 23-foot man, you just wonder what he's doing there," Harp said.

Sherman and McKay, who built the fiberglass giant from the parts of abandoned bodies.

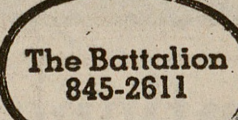
"Now, the head and hat came from one in front of a Phillips 66 station in Canton," Goode, who operates a fiberglass and sandblasting shop in Gainesville, said. "The body I bought from a go-cart track in Garland in 1971. Wind knocked it over. That's what happens to a lot of 'em. Paid 'em \$5 and hauled it off."

The hands, he sighed, were the touchy part.

"Found some at a muffler shop in Dallas," he said. "But they wanted \$650. Just for the hands!"

He built his own pair of hands, pulled molds from the other body parts, and used the forms to cast his 23-foot-tall fiberglass giants.

Goode recently planted the latest creation in front of Marlin "The Sandblast Man" Harp's shop just off Farm Road 1417 in Sherman.
