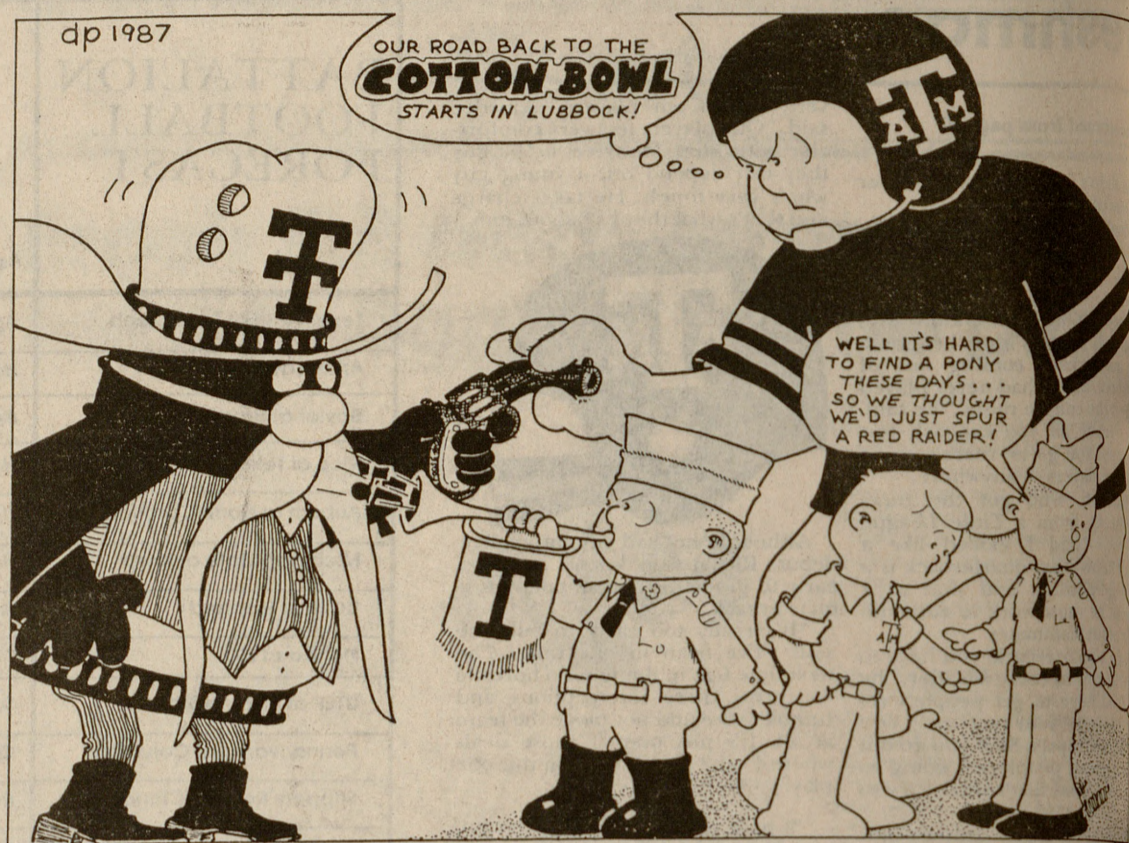

Bean

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As Bean crossed the goalline after the 94-yard touchdown run, he also entered the A&M record books for the longest run in Aggie football history.

Bean had blown open a close game, as the Aggies went on to defeat the Red Raiders 38-9.

Earlier in that same game Bean had scored on a 47-yard touchdown run off the same play.

He ended the game having picked up 180 yards rushing on nine carries and two touchdowns, good enough to have Sports Illustrated choose him as its national offensive back of the week.

While in the midst of the 94-yard gallop, Bean also supplanted Smith as the Aggies' all-time rushing leader, ending his career having gained 2,846 yards.

Since that time both Curtis Dickey and George Woodard have passed Bean on the rushing list, but each player did so on significantly more carries.

Back in the early days of the Wishbone offense, Head Coach Emory

Bellard never dialed anyone's number very often, a fact that both frustrated and yet inspired Bean.

"We didn't run very many different plays, nor did either Skip (Walker) or myself or any of the quarterbacks or fullbacks get 20-25 carries a game," Bean noted. "But we blocked for each other, knowing that when the time came for each of us to carry the ball, we had to do something with it because nobody knew when his number was going to come up again."

Bean's ledger is littered with games in which he picked up huge chunks of real estate without working up too much of a sweat.

For instance, he gained 100 yards against SMU in 1973 on 13 carries. Just two weeks prior to the Tech game, Bean had rushed for 158 yards on 12 carries against Illinois at Kyle Field before a regional ABC-TV audience.

ABC chose Bean as its offensive player of the game for his efforts. Interestingly enough in the third quarter, the Aggies scored three touchdowns on three consecutive offensive plays.

Shipman started the parade with a 59-yard run down the visitor's sideline, then after a fumble recovery Bean went on his long jaunt.

Illinois tossed a pass interception on its next offensive play - hello Lester Hayes - then Walker completed the offensive fireworks on first down with a 28-yard run right up the middle of the field.

Bean gained 204 yards on 22 carries, leading the Aggies to a 30-10 victory.

Along with other seniors such as Ed Simonini, Pat Thomas, Carl Ten Napel, and Richard Osborne, Bean's A&M career ended on a high note.

Ranked No. 2 in the polls entering the December 6 contest in Lubbock, A&M was humiliated 31-6 in front of a rabid crowd.

"Right before the half Arkansas got a touchdown pass on a play that Hayes came within an inch or two of preventing," Bean recalled. "The Wishbone just wasn't a catchup offense, especially with our personnel. That was a disappointing game for us."
