

**Key:**



**Map Discussion:** A large continental high pressure system moving southward out of central Canada will push a moderate to strong cold front into the midsections of the country with quite cool temperatures through the north-central states and some snow shower activity over the central Great Lakes region.

**Forecast:**  
**Today:** Fair to partly cloudy, warm and windy with a high temperature of 87 degrees and southerly winds at 12 mph, gusting to 20 mph.  
**Tonight:** Increasing cloudiness and mild with a low temperature of 67 degrees and winds southerly at 7 to 12 mph.  
**Saturday:** Partly cloudy and warm with gusty southerly winds of 10 to 18 mph and a high temperature of 89 degrees. Expect a 20 percent chance of rain locally with increased probability northwest through north in the immediate area. The cold front will be oriented northeast to southwest through Mexia at midday.

## EPA sends Texas \$1.2 million in aid to fix leaky tanks

Texas has received \$1.2 million from the Environmental Protection Agency to repair its leaking underground storage tanks.

The funds were given to the Texas Water Commission by the EPA on Oct. 1 for statewide distribution, said Roger Meacham, a spokesman for the EPA.

Meacham said the danger of leaking tanks is that their contents can seep into groundwater.

"If the problem goes unchecked, groundwater could be damaged to the point of being useless," he added.

Both Bryan and College Station use a groundwater source for their public water supply, but neither has had problems with toxins leaking into their wells.

Meacham said the funds are given to states based on the number of underground storage tanks in a state with an estimated leakage problem in 10 percent to 30 percent of the tanks.

William Colbert, director of public information for the TWC, said that there are about 150,000 underground storage facilities in Texas.

Meacham said that Texas received one of the largest grants in the nation for the clean-up effort because of the size of the state and the Texas petroleum industry.

If EPA estimates are correct, there are between 15,000 and 45,000 leaking tanks in Texas.

Colbert said convenience stores and gas stations that store petroleum products are the main users of underground tanks.

However, gas stations and convenience stores will not benefit during the \$1.2 million the state has received for underground storage tanks, Colbert said, because who the owner of an underground tank is available, it is that person's responsibility to finance the correction of the problem.

"The funds are to be used to clean up storage sites when a responsible party cannot be located," he said.

Colbert said there are tanks that need repairs that have been abandoned or for which the owner cannot be located. The TWC does not know how many of these abandoned tanks there are, he said.

Colbert said most tanks that have a leak need to be pulled out of the ground and replaced.

Leon Sevcik, owner of Sevcik Texaco on East 29th Street in Bryan, said it would cost about \$10,000 to replace an underground tank, but the tanks will last about 30 years, he said.

Colbert said that none of the \$1.2 million has been used yet in pairing or replacing tanks because the TWC still is determining the problem is and planning how the funds for the program.

## Superintendent to remove Dallas teachers with AIDS

DALLAS (AP) — The superintendent of Dallas schools told parents he would take AIDS-infected teachers out of the classroom — not because he believes students would be at risk, but to avert an emotional reaction.

Dallas Independent School District Superintendent Linus Wright said Wednesday after a meeting with Parent-Teacher Association members he doesn't believe such teachers' presence in the class room would pose a health hazard.

But he said he would remove the instructors because the situation could cause overriding social problems and emotional problems, even if there were no medical considerations.

A teacher infected with acquired immune deficiency syndrome could trigger an emotional reaction in the classroom, possibly causing a parents' boycott, he said.

One district employee is known to have AIDS, officials said. The named employee had been a teacher but was assigned this year to an administrative position, officials said.

The former teacher understood the reasons for reassignment and accepted it willingly, Wright said.

William Waybourn, president of the Dallas Gay Alliance, said, "There's no evidence anywhere of any level of anybody being a hazard in that context."

He said teachers who should be able to choose whether they want to stay in classrooms as administrators, and after moving teachers for fear of a negative reaction could cause problems later.

"If Dr. Wright follows that reasoning, then he will be discriminating against people who have a handicap and that is illegal," he said.
