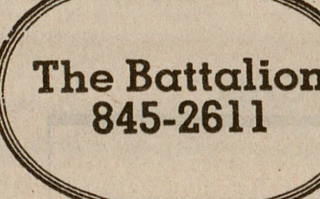
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Judge orders transfusion for baby girl

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A judge has ordered a blood transfusion for a premature baby despite religious objections from the child's parents.

The infant girl, who weighs about 1 pound, will remain in state custody until she no longer needs critical medical care, said State District Judge Tom Rickhoff, who signed the order Monday.

Hospital spokesman Terrie Carter said the child was in critical condition Tuesday at Santa Rosa Medical Center's neonatal intensive care unit. The child was born Friday with a condition requiring a blood transfusion to save her life.

"I talked with the doctor in person to make sure it was life-threatening if she did not get the treatment," Rickhoff said.

He said the infant's parents had refused to allow the transfusion on religious grounds.

The court order allowing the transfusion gives the state custody for 10 days, at which time a hearing will be held.

Nurse rescues elderly couple after accident

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — An elderly couple was trapped in their home for 24 hours after the ill woman fell and her wheelchair-bound, blind husband toppled over her, officials said.

Guadalupe Alvarez, 90, and Juanita Alvarez, 79, were in satisfactory condition Tuesday at Southeast Baptist Hospital, hospital spokesman Mary Watson said.

The couple was found Monday morning by their nurse, who had gone to visit Mrs. Alvarez, who suffers from a heart condition and other ailments.

Ruth Stone, a licensed vocational nurse, said Emergency Medical Service technicians later told her that Mrs. Alvarez was found on her side beneath her husband.

Alvarez was awake and alert when authorities arrived, but Mrs. Alvarez barely could speak, Stone said.

"They think she was trying to reach for her medical alarm, but couldn't press it," she said.

"Apparently she had fallen and he had tried to help her get up," Stone said.

City building inspector took \$30,000 in bribes from subcontractors

ARLINGTON (AP) — A city building inspector allegedly accepted up to \$30,000 in bribes in exchange for approving work by two plumbing subcontractors on new homes, officials said.

Alden Johnson, 44, was arraigned Monday on a bribery count, with bond set at \$50,000, Arlington police spokesman Dee Anderson reported.

A judge later ordered Johnson released from the Arlington City Jail. Johnson's supervisors at work call the case of bribery an "isolated incident."

"This is the first instance we've ever had of something like this," Pat Potter, a supervisor of inspectors said.

Johnson was fired last December after officials learned police were to arrest him on the bribery charge, according to Potter. The two plumbing companies claimed they were forced to pay bribes to the inspector when he made an inspection of buildings.

"One victim alleged he was given \$100 a week, and another \$500 a week," Anderson said. "The judge he said they had to pay it when they wanted to continue doing business in Arlington."

The second-degree felony carries a maximum punishment of 20 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine, Anderson said.

TEC announces higher rates of unemployment for states

AUSTIN (AP) — The slightly higher statewide unemployment rate for September is negligible, a labor market analyst for the Texas Employment Commission said.

The statewide rate was 8.5 percent, up from a revised figure of 8.3 percent in August.

"The main thing about the Texas unemployment rate is that it is still high, but the month-to-month fluctuation is negligible," TEC analyst John Kruse said in releasing Sep-

tember rates for the state.

"It is so insignificant that it is hardly worth commenting on," he said.

'Lunchroom Lady' dishes school meals for 35th year

AUSTIN (AP) — Her name is Novel Lee Clark, but to many of the thousands of Austin schoolchildren who have eaten the meals she's cooked, she's known only as the "Lunchroom Lady."

Clark, the cafeteria supervisor at Webb Elementary School in North Austin, has been preparing lunches for Austin Independent School District students for 35 years.

Some of the students she served at Blackshear now teach at Webb.

"I can't go to the mall or store or almost anywhere without running into kids I've had over the 35 years," Clark said. "They remember me, and I get embarrassed because sometimes I can't think of their names. There have just been so many of them."

Clark is one of about 690 people who work in the school district's 85 kitchens.

Vivian Bauhof, the school district's director of food services, said more than 5.7 million lunches were served to students during the 1986-87 school year. That works out to nearly 33,000 a day. Another 1.8 million breakfasts were served last year to students. Adult district em-

ployees ate more than 343,000 meals.

If all of the hamburger patties served by the district last year were lined up next to each other, they would stretch over 59 miles. Last year, the district also dished out more than 615,000 slices of pizza, served more than 7.6 million half-pint containers of milk and mixed

meals.

"The kids call them things like Jack in the Box style," Clark said. "And we have had some steak sticks just like you buy at Dairy Queen."

Clark said there have been changes.

"Thirty-five years ago we had powdered stuff like now," Clark said. "We make it all from scratch."

Clark said that while she's fixing meals for 800 children a day, sometimes she's cooking for her own household.

"When you go home, you're making a normal meal, but what you've made at school is such a small amount, that you're a member where you are."

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
