(Continued from page 1) because they're students here they can be a part of everything that happens here and that the female faculty will support them," Parrish said.

Parrish said she was glad the committee went to the bonfire even though some female students are apathetic about the situation. "There are a few or at least some women on campus that might feel a little bolder if they had some support," she said. But Parrish said she does not expect any great changes in the future. "I think that women would be harassed if they were even allowed to have the position of redpot," she said. "There is probably not going to be a woman redpot in my lifetime."

Injuries due to the heavy workload are not a problem, she says. "The redpots are really great this year — they emphasize safety at all costs," Cox says. "They keep an eye open for potential problems and are always ready to lend a hand. If it's not safe, they won't let you do it."

Redpot, junior redpot and yellowpot are the titles given to student group leaders at bonfire. Redpots are the coordinators for bonfire. Junior redpots, apprentices to redpots, prepare to assume the coordinating role the next year. Yellowpots are crew chiefs for the dorms.

The pots are passed on from year to year based on enthusiasm, effort and leadership ability. Scott Wille, Law Hall's yellowpot, says,

There are no female leaders, but Off-Campus Aggies had a female crew chief last year, Mallory says. Beth Harp, also in W-1, says there are not more women leaders at bonfire because nobody has wanted to be a redpot. She says it's very time-consuming and strenuous. "Someone told me once that every Corps member should dream of being a redpot," says Harp, a junior agricultural economics major. "I guess I just don't have the same dreams."

Although all women do not want

Nolte agreed that change would be slow. "I don't think there is going to be a female redpot in this century," Nolte said.

Nolte said that gradual change in the attitude toward women on campus will need to happen at deep levels within people. She said dramatic incidents do not ensure changes in people.


"I was pleased that we raised the consciousness (and showed) that we're concerned about any kind of discriminatory behavior," Nolte said. "I wasn't expecting major things," she said. "I just wanted to do some education and I think that's what did it."

Simone Weaver filed a report on harassment with University Public last year after she was assaulted while working on bonfire, according to Battalion articles.


Mallory says bonfire is less and always will be, a time to let steam, to "get grody." "You have to know what to expect when you come out and if you're not prepared for what goes on," he says "then it can be offensive."

"Anybody that takes any of it personally is wrong. It's just good fun," Harp says. "Bonfire animosity comes down to attitudes. If you say anything back or react, you are just looking for trouble," she says. "You can tell the people who come out just looking for trouble their attitude. Non-regs have a lot worse bias toward females. CTs know that we can do our share of the work — they've seen us work hard."

Light showers fail to douse blazes in Southern states

ATLANTA (AP) — Scattered light rain moved across parts of the drought-stricken South on Monday, but forest fires remained out of control in some states and forestry officials cautioned against too much optimism.

"We may get a couple of days of relief but one rain is not going to take us out of the fire season," U.S. Forest Service spokesman Doug Williams in Middlesboro.

He said rain fell over Texas, Mississippi, Louisiana, Kentucky and West Virginia as a cold front swung eastward across the region. Firefighters reported higher humidity and morning dew in some areas, he said.

West Virginia Gov. Arch Moore called out the National Guard on Monday to help firefighters. National Guardsmen also have been activated in Alabama, Georgia, Tennessee, Virginia and Kentucky, where 10 helicopters sprayed homes threatened in Middlesboro.

Heavy smoke from the fires had drifted northeastward and cut visibility as far as New England on Sunday. On Monday morning, the smelly haze had moved into northern Maine and New Hampshire, the National Weather Service said, but the advancing cold front began clearing the air over Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

As of Monday, more than 10,000 fires had charred approximately 224,900 acres on public and private land since Oct. 27 in the 13 states that make up the U.S. Forest Service's Southern Region, the region headquarters in Atlanta reports.

Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia all have had at least some fires in the past two weeks according to the Forest Service.

Fires in West Virginia, which not included in that region, had charred more than 150,000 acres including one that had burned more than 15,000 acres by Monday in Mingo County. The state estimates damage at \$45 million, mostly timber loss.

The combined total acreage in 14 states equals 584 square miles.

The weather service predicts from one-half to 2 inches of rain would fall on Alabama, with the heaviest precipitation expected over the area of the worst fires, around Tuscaloosa and Anniston.

But Richard Cunby, fire promotion director for the Alabama Forestry Commission, said the rain could be temporary. "If the rain followed by cool, windy weather could be back in the same situation in a couple of days," he said.

Arson was blamed for many fires in the 14 states.
