Ags, Horns set for Nov. 26 showdown

From Staff and Wire Reports Texas A&M and Texas appear to be headed for a Thanksgiving night showdown to decide the Southwest Conference football title.

It also looks like the Cotton Bowl guest team has already been signed, sealed and will be delivered on Saturday when Notre Dame makes it official.

Official invitations can't go out until next Saturday but the Cotton Bowl officials have seen four straight

Notre Dame games. Both A&M and Texas have one loss each with two games left includ-ing tough tests this Saturday.

The Aggies are at Fort Worth to meet hard-luck Texas Christian which lost by a point to Texas Tech two weeks ago then by three points to the Longhorns on Saturday.

After plastering Arkansas with its

first shutout since 1983 with a 14-0 caller off the field on his shoulders. victory on Saturday, the Aggies meet TCU in a noon (Raycom TV) clash.

Texas, a 24-21 survivor over the Horned Frogs, hosts the Baylor Bears in a 1 p.m. game in Austin. Baylor outlasted Rice 34-31 in Waco on Saturday.

Texas Tech also has a bowl bid on the line when it meets Houston Saturday night in the Astrodome with the Independence Bowl scouts in the press box. Houston dropped Temple 37-7 in a non-conference game while the Red Raiders rested.

Texas A&M has a reborn quarterback in senior Craig Stump, who came off the bench to direct a vital 78-yard touchdown drive in the second half.

Stump threw his first touchdown pass of the season and moved Coach Jackie Sherrill to carry his signal Longhorns could still make it by los-

At Pasadena on Saturday, Troy Aikman ran for one touchdown and passed for another in a 17-point third quarter as fifth-ranked UCLA blew open a close game and went on to a 47-14 victory over Washington to remain unbeaten in the Pacific-10 Conference.

The Bruins can become the first team in Pac-10 history to go through conference play with a perfect record by beating crosstown rival Southern Cal next Saturday. A victory or tie against USC will

send the Bruins to the Rose Bowl against Michigan State.

Seventh-ranked Notre Dame crushed Alabama 37-6 on Saturday and will reportedly play in the Cot-ton Bowl on Jan. 1 against the win-ner of the Southwest Conference.

After Saturday's play, Texas A&M and Texas each had a 4-1 records in the SWC.

Senior flanker Tim Brown caught The Spartans beat No. 16 Indiana four passes for 114 yards and became Notre Dame's career leader in onference championship and a reception yardage with 2,371 against ose Bowl berth. the Crimson Tide, who still have a Lorenzo White rushed 56 times shot at the Sugar Bowl.

> "That sounds like the people who predict the elections before the polls close," Cotton Bowl official John Scovell said of reports the Irish would be in Dallas on New Year's

> Undefeated and sixth-ranked Syracuse rallied from a 17-0 deficit to beat Boston College 45-17 and will most likely play in the Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1 against the winner of the Southeastern Conference.

> Jeff Burger passed for 217 yards and two touchdowns as Auburn moved closer to a berth in the Sugar by beating Georgia. The Tigers are 8-1-1 and 4-0-1 in the SEC, and they need a Nov. 27 victory over Alabama to clinch the conference outright.

Burger completed 22 of 32 passes and connected for touchdowns of 21 vards to Lawyer Tillman and 3 yards to Duke Donaldson. Georgia fell to 7-3 and 4-2, and was eliminated from the SEC title chase.

Fourth-ranked Florida State will probably spend New Year's Day at the Fiesta Bowl in Tempe, Ariz., against the loser of the Oklahoma-Nebraska showdown next Saturday.

The winner of the Oklahoma-Nebraska game will head for the Orange Bowl in Miami as the number one team in the nation. The most likely opponent for the Big Eight champ is third-ranked Miami, Fla. The Hurricanes, however, still have to play Notre Dame and South Carolina, so there's still a chance another team - such as Syracuse could make it.

Rodney Williams threw for two touchdowns, and Terry Allen scored twice as ninth-ranked Clemson defeated Maryland 45-16 to earn its second straight Atlantic Coast Conference football title. Clemson, 9-1 overall and 6-1 in the ACC, solidified its bowl possibilities, with the Tigers apparently going to the Cit-rus Bowl. The Tigers' opponent could be Penn State or the Alabama-Auburn loser.




