

Clements chooses Republican judge for justice position

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Bill Clem-ents chose a 38-year-old Republican eight Democratic justices. state district judge Wednesday to be the next chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court.

Clements said Judge Thomas R. Phillips, who was recommended by resigning Democratic Chief Justice John Hill, was his choice after reviewing some 40 candidates.

'I consider this appointment to be one of the most important that I will ever make as governor," Clements said

Phillips succeeds Hill, who is leaving the court in mid-term on Jan. 4 to campaign for changing the cur-rent system of electing Texas judges to a system of appointing them. Phillips, who becomes the first Re-

publican in modern times to head the state's highest civil court, said he

Sheriff claims he will deny inmates space

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - Federal prisoners here will face rides of three hours or more to court from other counties if Nueces County's sheriff follows through with his plan to deny them space at his over-crowded jail, a U.S. marshal said.

Nueces County Sheriff James T. Hickey told the Marshal's Service last week that, after Jan. 1, he will not accept federal prisoners when the population at the county jail and a new annex exceeds 374.

Prisoners headed for court in Corpus Christi would have to be shuttled to and from the Rio Grande Valley or Houston area, U.S. Marshal B.S. Baker of Houston said.

The sheriff also cited a pending federal lawsuit filed last year against Nueces County officials by 71 in-mates, which seeks court intervention in the conditions at the jail.

Baker said he understands Hickey's problems with the chronically overcrowded jail.

Baker said.

he would hold a "corrections sum-mit" after Thanksgiving with TDC officials and officials from some counties to discuss problems stemming from prison overcrowding.

Phillips said he wouldn't comment on any specific case, but he did say this is a crucial time for Texas' highest civil court.

"I believe that our Supreme Court is at a critical crossroads," he said. "This is a historic time to become a member of this court. It is a time of opportunity and of challenge to make a positive impact, one that is significant and long-term.'

Phillips will serve until the 1988 election. The winner of that election will serve the remainder of Hill's term, which ends in 1990.
