Lady Aggs meet Bears Arkansas this week

The Texas A&M Lady Aggies will resume their conference schedule this week against Baylor and Arkansas.
 A&M travels to Heart of Texas Coliseum in Waco for Wednesday's game with Baylor. Tip-off is at 5 p.m.
 Saturday the Lady Aggies are back in College Station to meet Arkansas.
 The game begins at 7:30 p.m. at G. Rollie White Coliseum.
 A&M is 6-4 this year and 0-1 in conference. Baylor is 6-7 and 0-2, while Arkansas is 5-7 and 1-1.

A&M Head Coach Lynn Hickey said, "We definitely have a lot to prove against (Baylor) since losing to them the last time we played them cost us a trip to the conference tournament... It is particularly important to have a victory on the road against them to make up for our loss at home against SMU."
 "(Arkansas) will be extremely competitive... The home court should be a real big advantage in this contest, but we will have to concentrate on executing rather than winning and revenge factors."

A&M plays host to TCU in swim meet Friday

The Texas A&M swimming team's first action of 1988 is Friday, as the men and women meet Texas Christian at P.L. Downs Natatorium.
 The men's and women's teams are both 1-1 this season with wins over TCU earlier this season. Both losses were to Southern Methodist.
 A&M Swimming Coach Mel Nash said, "This meet will be a great challenge for us. This will be the most tired that we will be going into a meet all year, because this is when we work the hardest."
 "We're exhausted, but we've heard that TCU will be coming into this meet well rested. That should

make the outcome interesting."
 "Fatigue is not the only factor working against A&M. Three swimmers are ill, and all three doubt for the meet."
 Sophomores Courtney Searcy and Mike Varozza had tonsillitis over the holidays. Searcy is doubtful, and Varozza is questionable. Sophomore Susan Habermas had walking pneumonia and is also as probable.
 "We have had a lot of aches, pains and some shoulder problems because of all the work that we've been doing," Nash said, "but everybody else should be ready to go."

Browns are confident they will contain Elway

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — The Cleveland Browns are certain they could devise a defensive scheme to prevent the scrambling of Denver quarterback John Elway in the AFC championship game Sunday.
 "Yeah, there's a way you can keep him in there, but in doing that you're going to make yourself vulnerable to something else," said Coach Marty Schottenheimer, whose team was holding the first of four workouts at the University of New Mexico on Tuesday.
 Although Schottenheimer downplays the potential effects of thinner air at Denver's Mile High Stadium, the Browns pointed out in a news release this week that the University of New Mexico is 5,314 feet above sea level.
 The Browns' familiarity with Elway goes back well beyond last year's conference title game, in which he guided the Broncos to a 23-20 overtime victory after they trailed 20-13 with less than a minute to play.
 Cleveland's first experience with Elway came in 1983, when Elway was perceived by many to be just another overpriced rookie. He had lost his starting job to Steve DeBerg after five games and returned to the lineup five weeks later only because DeBerg was injured.

touchdown passes, his first without sack, and his first with a completion rate above 60 percent (16 for .667).
 "I remember all the bad plays that one," Schottenheimer said. "There was no doubt in my mind he was going to be a great player. It was just a question of how long it would take."
 Elway has beaten Cleveland since then. He had poor passing statistics (15 of 35 for 170 yards) in three for two touchdowns as the Broncos beat the Browns 24-14 in 1984, and he completed 22 of 24 passes for 244 yards in last year's playoff victory.
 He also rushed four times for 44 yards in the playoff game, including twice for 20 yards on the 98-yard game-tying drive.
 Overall, the Broncos have won eight straight games against Cleveland.
 "Everybody in this league has tried to contain him in some way," Schottenheimer said. "When you're involved in defending an untouchable talent like John is, like Eric Decker is, you have to find ways to control or contain him as best you can. In doing so, you're going to give up something."

Cleveland visited Denver the 14th week of the season, and Elway came of age.
 Showing suddenly the confidence that had been his hallmark at Stanford, Elway was not sacked as he passed for 284 yards and two touchdowns to beat the Browns 27-6. It was his first game with over 200 yards passing, his first with two

A big part of the problem is Elway's speed, which Schottenheimer said is popularly quoted at an unimpressive 4.7 seconds in the 40-yard dash.
 "He may be 4.7, but when he's running to run away from somebody, he runs faster than that, because I do see many people catching him," Schottenheimer said.

Iowa remains on top in AP women's Top 20

 Iowa Coach Vivian Stringer has been near the top before when her Cheyney, Pa., team was ranked No. 2 in 1982. But she said life has become a little more complicated since her Hawkeyes reached the top spot in the Associated Press women's college basketball poll for the first time last week.
 Iowa, 11-0, remained No. 1 in this week's balloting by a nationwide panel of 64 women's coaches after beating Wisconsin and Northwestern, to start Big Ten play.
 "When we were No. 2 at Cheyney, it was no big deal because the newspapers didn't really pay that much attention to us," Stringer said about the school in suburban Philadelphia. "We were busy just trying to win games and get into the NCAA tournament."
 "But here, there's been a constant amount of attention and I think the players felt pressure last weekend to play perfect because of the crowd. I think we're going to forget we're No. 1 for a while and just concentrate on our league schedule, one game at a time."
 The next seven teams that trailed Iowa in the poll were almost the same as last week, except that Auburn, despite a 71-68 Southeastern Conference win at No. 4 Tennessee, dropped from its second place tie with unbeaten Louisiana Tech, 12-0.
 The Tigers, 12-1, remained close to the Techsters, who received three first-place votes and 1,200 points. Auburn collected the remaining first place vote and 1,170 points.
 Tennessee, 10-2, the defending NCAA champion, held fourth with 1,043 points.

Texas, 12-2, which began to cover from the loss of Clarissa DeLoe to a leg injury with three victories over Arkansas, Louisiana State and Rice, remained fifth with 911 points. Houston, ranked No. 20, is the only other Southwest Conference team in the list.
 Mississippi, 12-0, held sixth with 971 points, followed by Virginia Tech, 1, at seventh with 915 points. Ohio State, 9-2, at eighth with 871 points.
 Rutgers, 8-3, moved up a spot to ninth with 796 points, while Stanford, 13-0, advanced a notch to made its first-ever top 10 appearance with 711 points to complete the upper half of the poll.
 The voting was completed by the Ohio State defeated visiting Rutgers 75-60 Monday night.
 Duke, which lost to host Maryland 83-73 in an Atlantic Coast game, dropped from ninth to 11th.
 Vanderbilt, 9-3, which was at the buzzer by host South Alabama 73-71 on Sunday, fell out of the top 20 from 18th. Penn State, which is No. 20, also fell after two Atlantic Coast losses, including a surprising upset at Rhode Island Saturday.
 Southern Cal, which won Pac-8 games over visiting Oregon and Oregon State, rejoined the list for the first time in several weeks at No. 21 with an 8-3 record. Unbeaten Montana, 11-0, made its first appearance of the season at No. 19, just a place behind USC.
 The second ten were Georgia Tech, West Virginia, Washington State, Nevada-Las Vegas, Southern Cal, Montana and Houston.
