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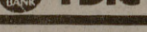
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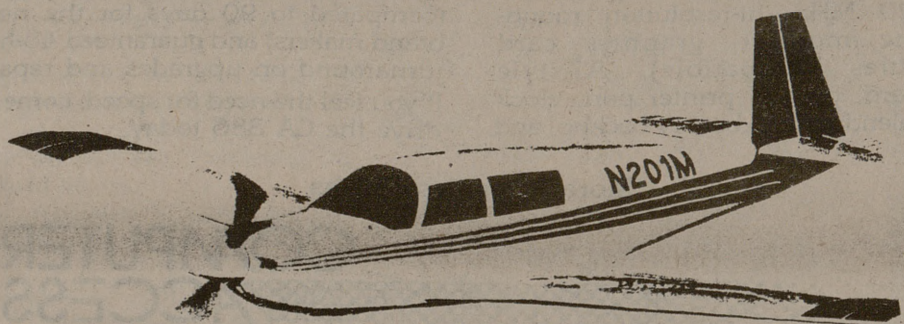

Mexicans register for July elections

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Nearly 38 million Mexicans have so far registered to vote in the July presidential elections, according to local press reports.

Almost 44 million of the nation's approximately 80 million citizens are eligible to vote.

Government electoral workers have another month to verify their registration rolls to put together the final voter tally.

Carlos Salinas de Gortari, as the presidential nominee of the ruling Institutional Revolutionary Party, is virtually assured of being sworn in as the nation's new president on Dec. 1.

Even so, the nation's opposition parties have nominated vocal candidates who are waging active campaigns throughout the country.

Cuahtemoc Cardenas, the son of one of the nation's most popular presidents, broke ranks with the ruling party to run on the ticket of the Authentic Party of the Mexican Revolution.

Manuel Clouthier, a northern businessman, will be on the July ballot as the candidate of the conservative National Action Party, the nation's largest minority party.

Leftist parties are fielding Heberto Castillo for the Mexican Socialist Party and Rosario Ibarra de Piedra for the Revolutionary Workers Party.

American oilmen go "down under"

ABILENE (AP) — The future for American's independent oilmen may be "down under" says a West Texas oilman who plans to drill on what he calls Prudhoe-style possibilities in Australia.

"Australia is vast, unexplored and has a stable government. Oil and gas exploration is just getting under way there, and there are only a handful of independents working there," says Bill Tindell, an Abilene geologist and former chairman and chief executive officer of Abilene-based Westco Energy Co. He calls Australia one of the few places left where an independent oilman can "roll the dice on something big."

Tindell, along with a group of independents from three states, is preparing to explore a 7,344,000-acre drilling concession which was recently awarded to the group by the state of Queensland, Australia. In size, the drilling concession is equivalent to almost 20 percent of the Permian Basin.

Beginning in April, the oilmen from Texas, Oklahoma and Illinois will drill wildcats on five of 13 subsurface structures identified as potential oil producers within the concession. The subsurface structures were identified by Landsat satellite imagery and later confirmed by magnetic surface mapping.

Group of Six discuss peace, trade

MEXICO CITY (AP) — President Miguel de la Madrid returned home Sunday from a trip to Sweden where he attended a meeting of the Group of Six, formed to promote peace and disarmament.

He also held talks with Swedish Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson and with Prime Minister Mario Soares in Lisbon during a stopover en route to Stockholm.

In an interview with the Mexican television network Imevision before returning, de la Madrid said he suggested that Sweden help Mexico increase its exports to other countries, as well as to Sweden.

"The Swedish have good technology. In Mexico there are conditions that give us advantages for being an export bridge, fundamentally for Latin America and the United States," he said.

He said Swedish officials agreed to explore the possibility.

The Group of Six, which was holding its third meeting, welcomed the disarmament agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union, but noted that it is a limited accord that affects only 5 percent of the atomic weapons of the two countries, de la Madrid said.

The leaders also discussed the possibility that steps toward nuclear disarmament could lead to an increase in conventional weapons and the need to use the money saved from disarmament on economic development.

In addition to de la Madrid, Carlsson, Primer Ministers Rajiv Gandhi of India and Andreas Papandreu of Greece and former President Julius Nyerere of Tanzania attended the meeting of the Group of Six.

President Raoul Alfonsin of Argentina also is a member but could not attend because of military problems in his country.
