We the People

...of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common Defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do hereby adopt this CONSTITUTION for the United States of America.

Article I.

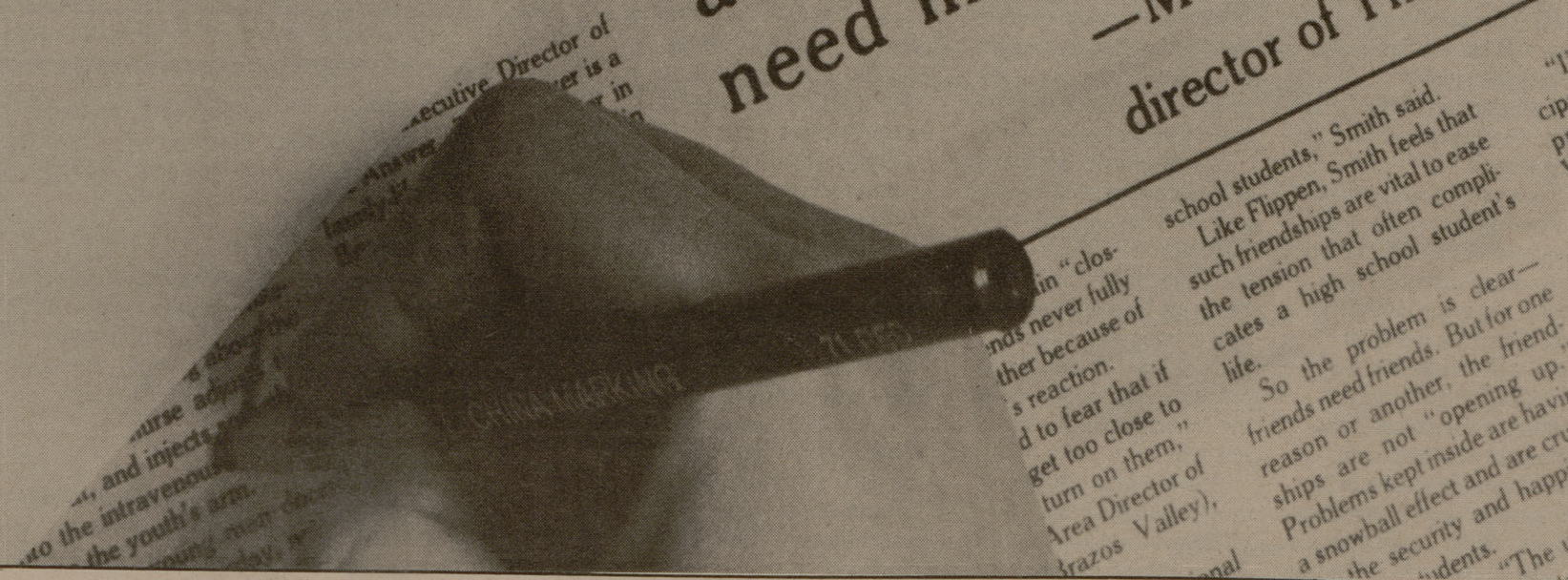
All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives. Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature. No Representative shall have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, seven Years shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole Number of free Persons, including Indians bound to Service, three fifths of all other Persons who shall be counted as free Persons, in such Manner as they shall be determined by Law.
