

approaches and the Texas Aggies look to improve on a 44-win season, three returning players become the focal points of the

On offense, it's Scott Livingstone. On defense, it's Chuck Knoblauch. And on the mound,

For the team to play well and challenge for the Southwest Conference title, each must play at least as well as he did last sea-

In 1987, third baseman Livingstone hit .403 with 19 home runs and 76 runs batted in. Livingstone won every award and was named to every All-Every-thing team imaginable. Livingstone's 1987 was a ca-

reer for most collegiate players. Improving on a season like that will be difficult, but Livingstone said he doesn't feel any pressure.

"It's going to be tough to re-

peat a year like I had last year," Livingstone said. "I had a good freshman year, a terrible sophomore year and a good junior year. I don't want to have a bad senior year. But I don't think it'll be any problem.

"I always want to live up to great expectations. And I always want to play to the best of my ability. I think any pressure I have is what I put on myself.'

Livingstone said he put a lot pressure on himself to perform well last season so that he would be selected high in the professional baseball draft. When he didn't play well, he got down on himself, he said. Livingstone was drafted by the Oakland Athletics, but decided to re-turn to A&M for his senior

season when he and the A's "didn't hit it off too well."

After missing 10 games last season with a separated shoulder and getting food poisoning while playing in the Pan American games is the playing in the Pan American games is Cube this season. can games in Cuba this summer,

Livingstone says he is 100-per-cent healthy. He said he is ready for pitchers who will be bearing down on him.

"I hope they do (bear down on me)," he said. "Last year a lot of them didn't want to throw to me. They didn't know about John (Byington) because he was a freshman. Now they know about him and they're going to have to throw to me because he's just as big a threat. It's going to e interesting to see how they

"We've got 'Big John' Byington behind me," he continued.
"I have to give him a lot of credit because teams don't want to face him so they have to throw to me. He helps me in that way.

Offensively, the Aggies lost only Ever Magallanes off a team that hit .347 in SWC play. Livingstone thinks everyone has improved during the off-season.
"I think we're better," he said.
