First acupuncture clinic in B-CS offers alternative

The staff at the first acupuncture clinic in Bryan-College Station combines Western medical knowledge with the ancient Chinese art of acupuncture, said Dannie Zhang, who started the College Station clinic.

The China Acupuncture Clinic located at 505 University Dr. E. opened Jan. 18.

Zhang said the acupuncture is performed by her father, Dr. Dyer Zhang, and by Dr. Dorothy Wang. Dannie Zhang, a doctor from Massachusetts General Hospital, diagnoses most of the patients before Wang or her father does the acupuncture.

She said Dyer Zhang concentrates on acupuncture points on the body and Wang on the facial points.

The doctors use the small acupuncture needles to treat such ailments as the common cold, facial palsy (paralysis of any voluntary muscle), tonsilitis, irregular menstruation and migraines.

There are 361 acupuncture points on the human body, she said.

"Acupuncture is not something that is easily explained," she said. "It has been applied in China for over 2,000 years and has been passed down from generation to generation."

Acupuncture is a safe, drug-free process, she said, which is a different sensation from getting a shot.

"It's not like that at all," Zhang said. "There is very little pain. There is a little sting at first, and then, there might be a burning sensation. The needle is not usually inserted more than half of an inch."

The needles are thrown away immediately after the procedure, she said.

Electrical-magnetic acupuncture is also available. This method is done without needles for people who are afraid of them, she said. This is called electrical-magnetic acupuncture.

"The stimulation is generated to the body through electrodes which are attached to the acupuncture points," Zhang said.

The World Health Organization claims that there are at least 41 cases which can be treated through acupuncture, she said.

Many stress-related symptoms such as lower back pain or a strained neck, can be treated through acupuncture, Zhang said. Students experience these from sitting at a desk for long periods of time, she said.

"These symptoms can also be treated through massage, which is done at the clinic," she said.

Besides treating disease, stress, acupuncture is used to help people stop smoking and lose weight, she said.

She said, "We have had a 95.5 percent success rate with quitting smoking (through acupuncture)."

The usual rate is \$35 for the first visit, \$25 for following visits and \$50 for a full program for weight loss or to quit smoking, Zhang said.

"We felt College Station was a good location," she said. "Because many people in this area are familiar with acupuncture and Houston is close."

Proposal to have English-only law brings arguments

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Making English the official language of Texas could jeopardize the education of non-English-speaking children and exclude their parents from the election process, opponents say.

But others say efforts to accommodate non-English-speaking immigrants slow their assimilation to American society and hinder economic achievement.

Supporters of both sides clashed Saturday during a seminar examining education and the press, moderated by former CBS News President Fred Friendly.

"Common language is the glue that holds a society together," Doug Harlan, a San Antonio attorney, said.

No special treatment is offered Japanese or Germans who have not yet learned English in public schools or voting booths, C.A. Stubbs, president of a local taxpayers association, said.

"I think it's a detriment to them blending into this society," Stubbs said.

At its most dangerous extreme, Mayor Henry Cisneros speculated, an English-only law could bar public agencies such as fire departments from requiring that bilingual dispatchers be hired, a situation that could result in tragedy for Spanish speakers faced with an emergency.

"I agree that we all need to master English to advance socially and economically," said Norma Cantu, associate counsel of the Mexican-American Legal Defense and Educational Fund Inc. "I disagree strongly with making it a law and an official language as much as I disagree with having an official religion or an official color. To put it in the law is a mockery of the Constitution."

The seminar was one of two presented Saturday during the San Antonio Conference on Law, Crime, Education and the Press. Sponsored by the *San Antonio Light* and hosted by the University of Texas at San Antonio, the seminar was produced by Friendly, director of the Columbia University Seminars on Media and Society.

Friendly directed discussion among 16 panelists, as he has done at more than 400 issues seminars during the past 14 years.

Three arrested after officers shot in face

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Three police officers answering a disturbance call were shot in the face and three men have been jailed on attempted capital murder charges, authorities said Sunday.

Patrolmen Ernest Celaya, 25, and John Sanchez, 25, were hospitalized in stable condition Sunday with gunshot wounds to the face and neck, police spokesman Sgt. Paul Buske said.

Buske said the two officers were injured at 11:30 p.m. Saturday when they went to investigate a report that someone in a wooded area was shooting at a house.

Celaya, a six-year police veteran, and Sanchez, a four-year veteran, entered the wooded area and identified themselves as policemen, Buske said.

"The officers were fired at and were pinned down by gunfire," Buske said.

Buske said Celaya was able to fire several times with his shotgun and Sanchez emptied his service revolver before both were shot.

Another officer, Pat West, backed his police car into the wooded area to take the officers out, Buske said.
