College staff stung by reneged pledge

DALLAS (AP) — Bishop College, stung by a man who reneged on a \$300,000 pledge and caught in a web of debt, may lose its bankruptcy court protection if it fails to meet its payroll Thursday, a federal official

Levi Watkins, interim president of the 106-year-old college, said he won't know until Thursday if the payroll can be met. Faculty and staff have gone nearly two months with-

instructors have not been paid since subject Bishop to lawsuits from its Jan. 22. subject Bishop to lawsuits from its 400 creditors, owed \$12.5 million.

A hearing was originally set for April 8, but McElreath has said he would ask U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Robert McGuire to speed up the hearing on his motion if Bishop fails to pay its faculty.


