Ballet troupe helps troubled company by taking half pay

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Ballet dancers, hoping to save the financially troubled company, have agreed to accept only half of the back pay owed them, their union leader said Tuesday.

"We felt like now that we've got the product, let's not fall," Kent White, a dancer who is acting as corps' union representative, said. "We said 'Let's find way to pay debts and continue with what we have.'"

Leaders of the Dallas Ballet announced Monday night that they will start a new season this fall with a re-structured debt, smaller budget and a full complement of dancers.

One of the keys to the comeback is an agreement by the dancers to accept half of the back pay owed them, Jack Page, the ballet's executive director, said.

"We're looking on it as a donation," White said, adding the dancers have a long history of helping the Dallas company raise funds.

"There are three members who are not happy with the arrangement, but we've got 20 who are very happy with it."

Page said the 30 dancers were owed about \$150,000 for 10 weeks in back pay, but agreed to take about half that.

Dallas Ballet officials canceled the remainder of the 1987-88 season in January, announcing it would dis-

band and complete a restructuring of the company by March 15.

Page said half the \$400,000 in unpaid bills was forgiven by dancers and creditors and about \$100,000 the remainder owed has been pledged.

"I don't think it's too early in the Dallas Ballet's too early," Page said. "We're very pleased to be a long hard fight."

Despite securing \$260,000 in pledges for next season, the company needs to raise an additional million before its October opening performance.

"We've normally raised at least third more than that," Page said. "We've got a long list of friends and supporters and we've got to them."

The ballet's revised \$2.4 million budget, down from \$3.1 million, calls for \$1.3 million in contributions to be donated by individuals and corporations.

Karl Zavitskovsky, president of Dallas Ballet Association, said dancers agreed to restructure the let's \$1.8 million debt into most-est payments over a 15-year period.

White said dancers made the sacrifice because they are committed to Dallas and to the troupe's artistic director, Flemming Flindt. He dancers were also impressed Page.

Officer death brings call for two-man units

BEAUMONT (AP) — A police union president wants City Council to return the police department to two-officer patrol units in the wake of the recent slaying of an officer who was killed while working alone.

Sgt. Mike Siebe, president of the Beaumont Police Officers Association, said he will ask council members next week to supply officers with modern bullet-proof vests at the city's expense.

Union members are concerned with police safety after last week's shooting death of Officer Paul Douglas Hulse Jr. as he investigated a suspect with a stolen car at a Beaumont hotel, Siebe told the Beaumont Enterprise on Monday.

Hulse had been in radio contact with a backup officer who was assigned to investigate a traffic fatality nearby.

A few minutes after the backup officer left for the fatality, Hulse 29, was shot and killed.

Hulse wore a bullet-proof vest that had front and back panels, the large-caliber bullet hit him on the side.

Siebe said officers buy their own bullet-proof vests, which cost as much as \$350.

He said the city can buy bullet-proof vests in bulk for less per vest than individuals officers pay.

Police Chief George Schulman said the department lost 10 officers in 1983 and again lost personnel strength in 1985 after the city's investment loss to ESM Government Securities, a defunct and bankrupt Florida securities dealer that frauded several public investors more than \$300 million in March 1985.

Convicted killer on death row receives stay from high court

HUNTSVILLE (AP) — A convicted killer scheduled to die for murdering a sheriff's deputy nine years ago won a reprieve Tuesday from the U.S. Supreme Court, hours before his scheduled execution.

By a 6-3 vote, the justices granted the stay pending action by the court on a formal appeal by John Henry Selvage.

ton jewelry store robbery but not drawn his gun.

The appeal covered several issues but Selvage's strongest chance of winning a reprieve stemmed from his use of the same argument before the Texas state court. Selvage's attorney said Selvage's case, attorney David Franklin said.

Franklin's attorney argued that Selvage's capital punishment law is unconstitutional because it allows jurors from giving full consideration to "mitigating circumstances" suggesting life in prison as more appropriate than the death penalty.

The dissenters were Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and justices Byron R. White and Sandra Day O'Connor.

Attorneys for Selvage filed an appeal with the high court Tuesday, a day after an appeals court vacated a stay granted by a federal judge.

Selvage was sentenced to die before dawn Wednesday for the shooting death of Harris County Sheriff's Deputy Albert Garza, who was killed July 30, 1979 — his 48th birthday. Garza was trying to prevent a Hous-
