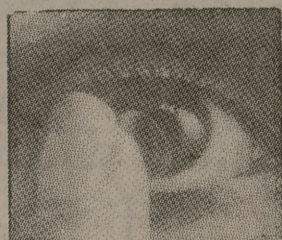

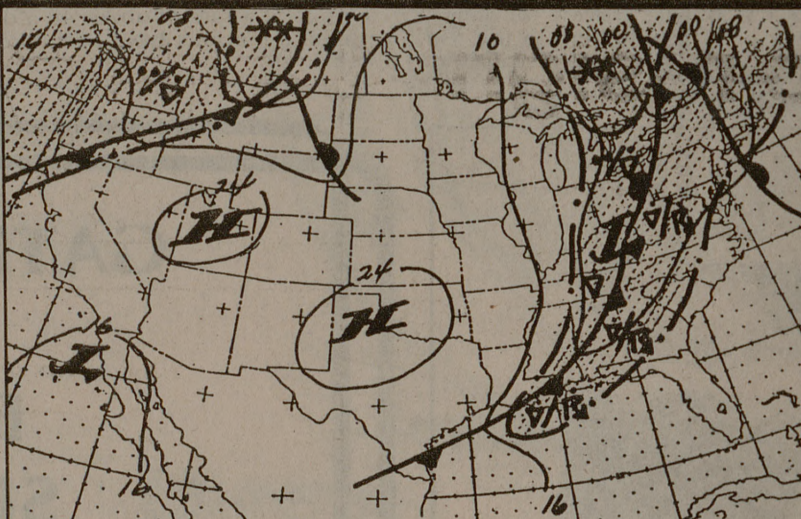

**Map Discussion:** The cold front that passed Bryan-College Station last night, with an intense low pressure system over the Central Appalachians, will produce widespread showers and thunderstorms in the eastern United States. The air mass behind the front in the northwest is maritime in origin; thus, expect no significant snow. Locally, we will experience decreasing cloudiness, but it will be somewhat cooler today, tonight and tomorrow. As the high pressure cell in the Texas panhandle moves rather rapidly eastward, we will start a warm trend again Thursday afternoon.

**Forecast:**

**Today:** Mostly cloudy early with decreasing cloudiness through the day. High of 75. Winds north at 12 to 20 mph, with a slight chance of a post-frontal shower this morning.

**Tonight:** Fair and mild. Low of 47. Northeast wind at 3 to 8 mph.

**Thursday:** Partly cloudy and warm. High of 81. Winds will return to the southeast at 7 to 12 mph.

**Weather Fact:** Ionization - In atmospheric electricity, the process by which neutral atmospheric molecules become electrically charged. The main sources of atmospheric ionization are cosmic rays and emanations from radioactive gases.

AUSTIN (AP) - The American Association for Protecting Children has been selected to examine the state's Child Protective Services Program, the Texas Department of Human Services said.

The association is to identify strengths and weaknesses of the program and recommend ways to improve services to neglected and abused children and their families, department Commissioner Marlin Johnston said Monday.

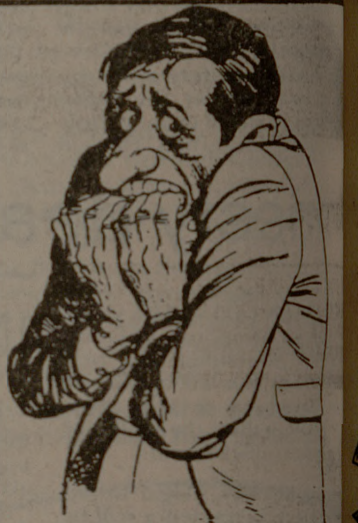
