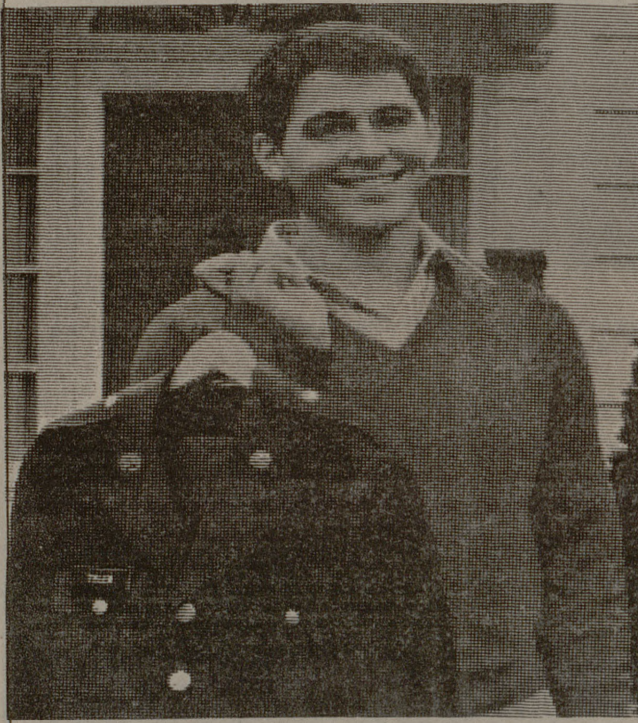

Organization sponsors week for youngsters

A local organization is sponsoring the annual Week of the Young Child celebration to raise the community's awareness of young children's rights and needs.

The celebration, held by the Brazos Valley Association for the Education of Young Children, will take place in the Brazos Valley next week beginning Sunday.

The association is a local affiliate of the national professional Association for the Education of Young Children.

"We are focusing on children-2 to 8 years old and their rights to things like security and adequate housing and shelter," said Week of the Young Child Chairman Carol Eubanks.

One of the primary goals of the celebration, with the theme "We care for America's children," is to improve professional care of young children, Eubanks said.

Local observance of the week will begin Sunday at Manor East Mall where there will be several live performances aimed at entertaining young children, Eubanks said.

The festivities, taking place from noon to 5 p.m., will include performances by a children's choir, a dance school, gymnasts, various clowns and Lester the Puppet, Eubanks said.

In addition, "Magination Station will perform one-act plays that are designed for the enjoyment of young children, she said.

"In one play, the actors actually start in the audience and come up on stage one at a time and get in costume in front of the children," Eubanks said. "This sort of thing helps children understand the difference between reality and fantasy."

In between the various performances, door prizes donated by local merchants will be awarded to children, she said.

Apart from the performances, there will be activity booths for children including face painting, musical activities and an animal petting zoo, Eubanks said.

Other exhibits for children will include height and weight charts, pet care, bicycle safety and a booth for

children to make spotlight on Eubanks said.

"There will also be all kinds of literature for parents about care," she said.

All activities on Sunday are free, she said.

The mayor of Bryan officially declared the week as the Week of Young Child in Brazos Valley said.

"Every day of the week, facilities are free to celebrate Week of the Young Child as they choose," Eubanks said.

A PBS television documentary, "Who Cares for America's Children?" will be aired Wednesday at 7 p.m., she said.

Week of the Young Child is annually across the nation, she said.

The Brazos Valley Association for the Education of Young Children conducts monthly meetings with members who are primarily day center owners and employees banks said.

"We have a few parents in organization, but we would like to have more parents as members," she said. "Our meetings include speakers who discuss professional care. This is a source of information in the community with children every day."

In the three years that she has been involved with the organization she said membership has risen from 25 to 200.

"The issue of professional care has grown with so many mothers," she said. "Our organization has grown as a result."

District spokesmen State is obligated to change funding

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas has an obligation to replace the current school finance system, which has been ruled unconstitutional, with one that is equitable, a spokesman for poor school districts said Thursday.

However, poor districts don't expect a future school finance system to give them the same ability to raise money as the state's richest districts, Richard Kirkpatrick told the Select Committee on Education.

Kirkpatrick heads a group of 55 low-wealth districts that joined a school finance lawsuit against the state.

"Common sense tells us that the state has a legitimate and compelling interest in not providing us the opportunity to spend \$15,000 per student with a local tax effort of only a dime," said Kirkpatrick, Copperas Cove district superintendent.

"It seems perfectly clear to us that even if the state could raise that much money, it would not appropriate it for public education, and no court would or could require the state to do so," he said.

But it is wrong that the local property tax increase, needed to raise \$100 per student, should be 24 cents in the Edgewood district in San Antonio, for example, but only 6 cents in the Azle district, Kirkpatrick said.

The state "has the capacity, and we believe the responsibility, to adopt a system that would equalize the rates" for such districts, he said.

Kirkpatrick and other representatives of low-wealth districts who spoke to the committee did not recommend a new system to fund public schools.

State District Judge Harold last year ruled that the present finance system, which is based on district property taxes and funds, is unconstitutional.

The state, and districts on both sides of the case, argued against the ruling before a 3rd Circuit Appeals panel Wednesday. The panel said the court could rule in months.

"Our position is that it's up to the Legislature to deal with this and design a constitutional system," said Al Kauffman of the American Legal Defense and Education Fund. He is an attorney for school finance case.

The lack of a specific remedial provision was criticized by Sen. Parker, a Port Arthur Democrat, who heads the Senate Education Committee.

"You spent all this time stirring the pot," he said. "You come here with a plan."
