# Texas retailers avoiding law, officials report

AUSTIN (AP) — Up to 80 percent of retailers are not complying with a new state law requiring a license to sell spray paint and glue that can be abused as inhalants, state officials said Tuesday.

The law that took effect March 1 applies to as many as 20,000 retailers, but only about 4,000 of them have applied for and received licenses to sell the products, Texas Health Commissioner Robert Bernstein told a news conference. The products can be abused through inhaling fumes.

"Retailers need to understand that (Texas Department of Health) licenses are mandatory, if they are to continue selling the inhalants covered by this law," Bernstein said. "I don't think the important of regulating the sale of inhalants can be overstated."

The law passed by the 1987 Legislature requires people selling the products to display their licenses and to post conspicuous, bilingual signs warning that spray paint and glue with harmful vapors must not be sold to those under age 18.

A retailer who sells the products without a license faces a class B misdemeanor charge for the first offense, and a third-degree felony charge for the second offense.

The state license, which must be renewed each year, costs \$25, Bernstein said. Money from the license is to be used for inhalant abuse programs.

Among the programs being considered by the board of the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse are projects for high-risk people, such as children of substance abusers, and packages providing information on inhalants for businesses.

Inhalant abuse is predominantly a problem involving young people, officials said. Bernstein said the abuser usually is between the ages of 11 and 17, and some have been as young as 5.

Consequences of abuse include permanent respiratory disorders, heart attacks, brain damage and death, Bernstein said.

Rep. Bill Blackwood, R-Mesquite, said, "It is a cheap high, and the reason it goes down into the younger ages is because it is inexpensive and relatively available. The product is in the home, and the kids can come home after school and get high. It is in all classes of society."

Blackwood, sponsor of the new measure, also heads a committee created to examine the inhalant abuse problem and make recommendations to the 1989 Legislature.

# Minorities protest naming of school after Alamo hero

AUSTIN (AP) — Hispanic and black leaders are urging Austin school officials to name a new high school after someone other than Alamo hero James Bowie, arguing that Bowie was a slave trader.

Gary Bledsoe, president of the Austin chapter of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said Bowie isn't the kind of person whose name should be on a school.

"The plain and simple truth, according to some of the most noted Texas historians . . . is that Jim Bowie smuggled slaves into North America, sold them at vastly inflated prices, owned, then sold, fictitious land grants for Texas land, fraudulently sold land owned by his inlaws and committed many other heinous and nefarious acts," Bledsoe said.

The group of black and Hispanic leaders have suggested that the school be named after a Hispanic. None of the Austin high schools have Hispanic namesakes.

The item wasn't on the Austin Independent School District Board of Trustees' agenda Monday. For the item to be placed on the agenda for reconsideration, one of the board members who voted for the high school name must request that the matter be reheard.

The Daughters of the Republic of Texas and 420 other people recommended the school be named for Bowie. In a March vote, two board members — Beatriz de la Garza and Bernice Hart — voted against Bowie as the name for the new school.

A Kentucky native, Bowie was an adventurer who by the age of 18 had earned a reputation for riding alligators and wrestling bears. In 1828, he moved to Texas and settled in San Antonio. After first sharing command at the Alamo with William B. Travis, Bowie fell ill and died on March 6, 1836, when Mexican soldiers captured the mission. A county and a city in Texas are named for him.

The NAACP and others sent a letter complaining of the name choice to the school board April 11. Three days later, retired Texas Supreme Court Chief Justice Jack Pope also urged that the school be renamed.

# Nation's black leaders name abuse of drugs as top urban problem

FORT WORTH (AP) — The No. 1 problem of the black community is drug abuse, black leaders said Monday in a discussion at the opening day of the sixth annual conference of the National Forum for Black Public Administrators.

"More than 80 percent of all crime in the country is drug-related," Beny Primm, a drug expert from Brooklyn, N.Y., said after the session. "In the black community, that figure is 90 percent."

Nearly 100 administrators participated in the 90-minute discussion of drug abuse.

"You need an organized effort on the part of the local community to demand that the police do something about drugs," Primm told attendants at the workshop "Drugs and the Black Community." "We must bug somebody about it every day if necessary."

The annual conference brings together black governmental leaders to meet, exchange ideas, network and recruit, organizers said.

On Wednesday, six leading mayors will participate in a discussion of the problems of urban America. Mayors expected to participate include Tom Bradley of Los Angeles, W. Wilson Goode of Philadelphia, Andrew Young of Atlanta, Marion and Barry of Washington, D.C.

Henry Gardner, city manager of Oakland, Calif., and president of the public administrators' group, said the discussion on drugs was an appropriate topic to kick off the conference.

"This is perhaps the most urgent topic we will discuss here this week," Gardner said. "Because of the destruction that illegal drugs cause in the black community, because of the violence and the poor role models, this causes a total breakdown in the community."

**Southland plans to stop construction**

DALLAS (AP) — Southland Corp. plans to virtually halt construction of new 7-Eleven stores for the immediate future and use operating cash to repay debt on the founding family's leveraged buyout completed in December.

The Dallas-based company, which is privately owned, revealed its plan in a recently released corporate profile of the company.

Southland's construction and acquisition program has added more than 1,600 stores in the past three years.

Southland should remain the nation's largest operator of convenience stores, a company spokesman said.

Despite the shift in strategy following the Thompson family's \$4.9 billion leveraged buyout, Southland will continue to operate about 7,500 convenience stores in 1988.

This is about 3,000 more than its closest competitor, Circle K Corp. of Phoenix, Ariz.
