Owners of cattle will vote on plan for promotions

Cattle owners will determine by May 10 whether to continue the Beef Checkoff program that collected about \$73 million nationwide in its first year — \$12.9 million in Texas — for beef promotion and research.

Required by the 1985 Farm Bill, the Beef Checkoff Referendum will gauge response to the checkoff program, which allots \$1 per head of cattle for beef research and promotion.

The checkoff was allowed a maximum operation period of 22 months before the required referendum. Cattle producers opposed to the checkoff were entitled to request a refund of the checkoff withholdings.

About 5,000 Texas A&M students could be affected by the referendum results and are eligible to vote on it, said Dr. O.D. Butler, chairman of the Texas Beef Referendum Steering Committee, associate deputy chancellor for agriculture and professor emeritus of animal science.

Any group, partnership or individual who has owned one or more head of beef or dairy cattle between Oct. 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988 is eligible to vote on the referendum. There are no age restrictions, so undergraduate students who have owned cattle for 4-H, Future Farmers of America or similar programs also may vote.

"Students inherit the whole business, so it's very important for them to vote," Butler said. Much of the cattle owners' benefit comes from the research supported by the checkoff program, he said.

"The main thing it does is provide funds, so researchers at A&M can get the money to make grant proposals," he said. "We're certain to get our share of research grant money."

The checkoff money also funds commercials and beef promotions, including the endorsements by celebrities such as James Garner and Cybill Shepherd.

"Some say that a lot of money is being spent on movie stars," Butler said. "That's true, but it has been effective."

"Cybill Shepherd wasn't hired to appeal to the beef producers. She was hired to appeal to a younger, health-oriented group."

Although some of the checkoff money must be applied to administrative costs, no more than 5 percent may be spent on administrative costs, Butler said.

"There has been some extra-gance in administration before," Butler said. "But the law restricts payments to 5 percent, and so far, we've not been spending 2.8 percent."

Butler said he estimates that more than 13 percent of cattle owners are opposed to the referendum. He said that no organization as a whole opposes it, but some individual owners reject the idea of association with the government. Others believe they do not benefit from the checkoff program, he said, because they are not members of any of the nine organizations represented on the Beef Promotion and Research Board.

"The only problem we're dealing with is apathy," Butler said. "There really no question that the referendum will be approved."

Agents arrest 13, seek 8 with links to gang bombings

DALLAS (AP) — Thirteen members of the Bandidos motorcycle gang were arrested and eight others were being sought on federal explosives and conspiracy charges stemming from two 1983 bombings, authorities said Sunday.

said Richard Garner, special agent in charge of the Dallas division of the U.S. Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The arrests Saturday in Corpus Christi, Longview and Lubbock included the top hierarchy of the national Bandidos gang, who are accused of staging the bombings in retaliation for an earlier 1983 clash with the rival Bancha gang, authorities said.

A bomb placed near the gas meter of a home in Lancaster, a south Dallas suburb, exploded the morning of July 5, 1983. Later that day in Dallas a man and his 1-year-old daughter received minor injuries when a bomb exploded inside the van they were driving.

The bikers were named in a 23-count sealed indictment returned March 31 by a Dallas grand jury, authorities said.

The blasts were believed to be intended for members of the Bandido Garner said.

Two other Bandidos members named in the indictment were already in custody in federal prison,

"Earlier in the year, in the spring of 1983, the Banches and the Bandidos got into an altercation in Port Arthur that resulted in one Bandido member being killed and several members of each club being wounded," Garner said.

County, city officials reach trial agreement on convention center

FORT WORTH (AP) — The city and Tarrant County have reached an agreement about control of the aging Tarrant County convention center, which officials say has the kind of problems that discourage business.

Melvin Morgan, the center's executive director, said, "Our folding chairs are 20 years old. The first 10 years of this facility were centered on rock 'n' roll concerts, and visitors stood and dropped and spilled on our furniture. If it was in your home, you'd throw it away."

If the agreement reached Saturday is approved by the City Council and county commissioners, officials would begin work to lure more convention business and to fix structural and equipment problems in the 20-year-old downtown building.

The plan that came out of the meeting includes changing the name to Fort Worth-Tarrant County Convention Center and keeping ownership in county hands.

"It's embarrassing to look at when you go there today," City Manager Doug Harman said. "This is a long-standing sore subject with the businessmen of Fort Worth."

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
