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
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A&M ultimate Frisbee goes to regional meet

The finals weekend pressure will be doubly tough for seven members of Texas A&M's ultimate Frisbee club, Ultamu, when they represent the club at the Collegiate Regionals Tournament in Austin May 7-8.

Club president Terry Strickland, a junior petroleum engineering major from Redding, Calif., said the conflict with finals made it hard to find people to go and compete. He said the 20-member club will be better represented at a July 4 competition in Boulder, Colorado, where about 20 teams will play.

Fielding a competitive ultimate team of students is difficult because of time conflicts, Strickland said. The A&M club's chief rival, the Austin Bunnies, practices all week just to play on the weekend, he said. The Bunnies also have players from cities across the state who travel to tournaments and play for the team. Strickland said the experience teams like

this can field is their biggest advantage because students here are able to get a lot of competitive experience.

"Most of the skill in ultimate is the disk handling," he said. "It's not kind of weak there. Some of the teams we play have guys that have played for eight or 10 years. Our team is really good in practice, we lack experience against guys in tournaments."

Ultimate is similar to football, soccer with a disc, with the emphasis on passing, Strickland said. A game ends when the first team scores 12 points to 15 points needed to win. He said the national club, the Ultimate Players' Organization, sets the rules of the game and tournament and announces dates for the competitions.

Ultamu practices at 6 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays on the Drill Field, and Strickland invites everyone to "bring your disks, come on out and have some fun."

Brewers win 6th straight; 4-run 1st beats Rangers 9-1

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Greg Brock's triple keyed a four-run first inning and Bill Wegman pitched a four-hitter Thursday as the Milwaukee Brewers won their sixth straight game, defeating the Texas Rangers 9-1.

Milwaukee's Glenn Braggs added a three-run homer in the fifth off loser Bobby Witt, 0-5, who walked five batters in 5 1-3 innings to increase his American League-leading total to 35.

Wegman, 3-3, pitched his third complete game of the season, struck out two and walked one. Texas scored its only run on Pete O'Brien's seventh homer of the season in the fourth inning.

The Brewers gave Wegman an early lead when Witt walked to bin Yount and B.J. Surhoff walked one out in the first and Brock followed with a triple off the center field wall, just beyond Orel Hershiser's leaping reach.

Brock scored on Witt's walk to pitch for the third run. Witt walked Rob Deer, who moved second on an infield out, and scored on Jim Gantner's single to center.

Surhoff singled and Deer walked in the fifth before Braggs homered to left, just over the stretched glove of Pete Incaviglia. Braggs' homer was his third of the season and increased his team-leading RBI total to 20.

A's beat Jays 8-5 for 11th straight win

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Mark McGwire's one-out single in the seventh inning scored Carney Lansford to put Oakland ahead and the Athletics stretched their winning streak to 11 games Thursday with an 8-5 victory over the Toronto Blue Jays.

Lansford walked to lead off the seventh and stole second. With one out, McGwire singled to left field off Jose Nunez, 0-1, and Lansford, running through the

third base coach's stop sign, threw home by inches.

Eric Plunk, 3-1, was the winning pitcher in relief. The American League West-leading A's won for the 15th time in 16 games as they matched the Oakland club record, set in 1981, with the winning streak.

Terry Steinbach drove in three runs for Oakland and Jose Nunez had three hits and two runs batted in.

Calumet Farm does not have a Derby starter, and the Affirmed team of trainer Laz Barrera and jockey Steve Cauthen, who in 1978 was an 18-year-old riding phenom, are not here.

"My name is Lazzaro 'Affirmed' Barrera," the trainer has said. "He's the best horse there ever was."

"It was one of great rivalries in the sport," Cauthen told The Associated Press in England. "I'm proud to have been a part of it."

Cauthen has been riding in Britain since 1979 and has been national champion there three times.

Affirmed and Alydar hooked up six times as 2-year-olds, with Affirmed winning four of them and the 2-year-championship. Their first meeting of 1978 was in the Derby, which launched probably the most exciting three-race duel in the sport's history.

In the summer of 1977 when the rivalry was only two or three races old, Barrera realized how good Affirmed could be. He also realized how dangerous an opponent Affirmed was going to be, and he told Wolfson.

Wolfson tried unsuccessfully through Leslie Combs, then owner of Spendthrift Farm, to buy Alydar from the late Admiral and Mrs. Gene Markey, the owners of Calumet Farm.

Affirmed won his first four races as 3-year-old in California, including the Santa Anita and Hollywood Derbies.

Alydar won his first three starts, including the Flamingo and Florida Derby, then prepped for the Derby with a monster performance in the Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland. He was 11 lengths back with five-eighths of a mile to go and won by 13.

"Going into the Derby I knew the horse to beat was Affirmed, and he

and Alydar hadn't hooked up a long time," Velasquez said. Their meeting was the Laurel Futurity, 29, won by Affirmed by a neck.

"I like my chances going into the race," Velasquez said.

"I didn't think there was a chance in hell Affirmed could beat us," he said.

Affirmed broke second and still second after the one-quarter mile run past the stands the time. Alydar was ninth.

"Alydar had a rough trip," he recalled. "He got hit in the eye, clod down the stretch the first John said not to say anything, cause he didn't want to make excuses."

A vet was summoned to the operation barn, where Alydar was taken for his post-race test, because he was in agony.

Affirmed dropped to third, regained second before taking lead from Believe It in the quarter pole.

"I would have needed wing mirrors to see Alydar behind me always came from behind," Cauthen said. "I believe he was placed and then made a hell of a run, but the challenge never materialized as it did in the Belmont and Preakness when he was so close."

"He didn't get to racing until last three-sixteenths of a mile. I think he lost by a length or so, but I think he was a hell of a horse."

Affirmed's winning margin was 1 1/2 lengths.

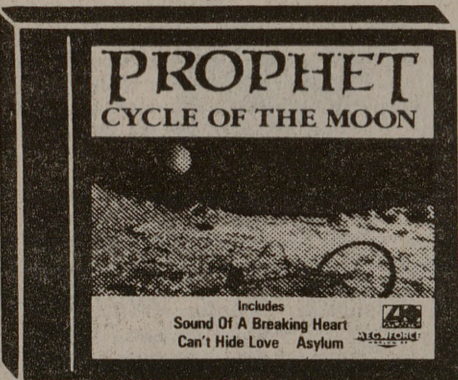
Rose recalled thinking, "How going to beat us in the Preakness." Affirmed won by a neck.

After a spectacular stretch drive was Affirmed by a head.

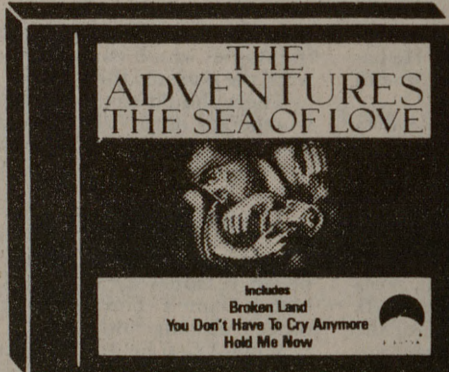
