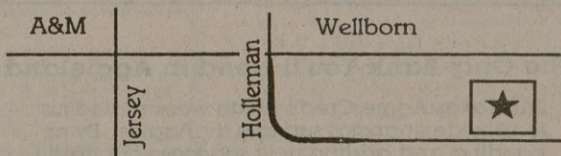

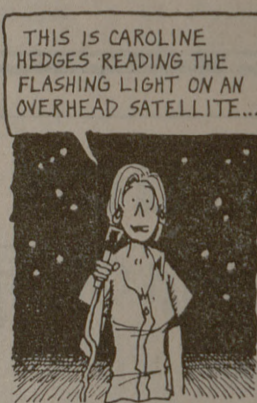

Large response prompts TAES to add spaces

Minority students in agriculture and home economics are responding in such large numbers to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service internship program that the number of positions had to be increased from 5 to 16.

Bill McConnell, personnel officer, said a strong commitment to minority students prompted the Director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Zerle Carpenter to develop the program in 1987 to get more blacks and Hispanics interested in the service.

"The purpose of the internship is for us to identify qualified and interested minorities who may be willing to go to work for the service when they complete their college work and also to give these folks a quality educational experience," McConnell said.

The interns are responsible for following the service guidelines, which include keeping records on their assigned counties and submitting reports of their experiences at the end of the term, McConnell said.

Mario Perchez, a biology graduate student and an extension service intern at A&M, said his job in horticulture involves researching parts of South Central Texas to determine which areas yield the best crops. A typical day for Perchez includes attending class in the morning and collecting data on fruits and vegetables in the afternoon.

"I am grateful for the minority student program because it has given me the opportunity to work with many of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service professionals," Perchez said.

McConnell said the service tries to place interns in the same counties as their hometowns or universities and gives each intern the option to work part time throughout summer or full time for one summer semester. By doing this, the service hopes to cut down on the students' living expenses.

Minority students interested in summer internships need at least a sophomore classification and major in agriculture or home economics and have a minimum 2.5 grade-point ratio.

"We are excited about further expansion of the program and have been real pleased with the response we've had from County Extension agents who are very willing to do the extra work that it takes to supervise the interns," McConnell said.

Similar intern programs also exist at Prairie View A&M, Texas A&I University, Tarleton State University and Texas Tech University.

Shuttle launch delayed to September

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The launch of Discovery on the first space shuttle mission since the Challenger disaster has been officially delayed several days, a NASA spokesman said Tuesday.

An announcement from space agency headquarters in Washington confirmed what many launch site officials have been saying for some time, that an August launch was impossible because it is taking longer than expected to prepare Discovery for flight.

The announcement said the new goal is a launch in early September. Astronaut Jon McBride, NASA's liaison with Congress

told a meeting in Washington target is Sept. 4.

The delay was the third announced this year, with earlier launch dates set in February and August. But, one by one, they have fallen by the wayside as technical problems hold up the nation's recovery from the loss of space shuttle Challenger and its seven crew members in a fiery explosion 73 seconds after liftoff on Jan. 28, 1986.

For several weeks, the space agency has carried Aug. 22 as a public target for launch, but that was abandoned unofficially some time ago.

Official pleads innocent in Contra affair

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former CIA official pleaded innocent Tuesday to charges he conspired illegally to arm the Contra rebels and then asserted through his lawyer that he was only following President Reagan's policies.

After Joseph F. Fernandez, 51, the agency's former station chief in Costa Rica, entered his plea in U.S. District Court, his attorney said he had committed no crime and that his indictment sends a chilling message to the nation's intelligence agents.

The message tells agents that "Should you become enmeshed in activities... involving policies where there may be an absence of

political harmony at home, you may find yourselves upon your return to the United States the targets of criminal prosecution," defense attorney Thomas E. Wilson said in a statement to reporters.

"Throughout the time Mr. Fernandez served in Costa Rica, his actions were entirely consistent with United States law and with the declared policies of the president of the United States," Wilson said.

Fernandez, who left the CIA last year, stood in U.S. District Court when U.S. District Judge Aubrey E. Robinson Jr. asked for his plea.

Video evidence aids Pentagon probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Investigators in the Pentagon bribery probe regard as significant potential evidence videotapes of recorded meetings between Defense Department personnel and industry consultants, sources said Tuesday.

More than one of the tapes picked up an audible sound track of the conversation, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The sources refused to say whether the tapes show money or confidential government documents changing hands, but one said the participants are doing more than talking.

One source said "there are a lot of many videotapes, videotapes are not an extensive technique in the case," largely because of the difficulty of making arrangements to tape a meeting that might be taking place without much advance notice.

But the sources said the government regards the videotapes as important evidence when combined with extensive wiretapping that has been the basic tool in the investigation to date.

Information gathered from the phone taps about meetings that were to take place allowed FBI agents to set up the videotaping, the sources said.

Turks fake plot to assassinate Pope

VIENNA (AP) — Two Turks seeking notoriety faked a plot to kill Pope John Paul II on the first day of his visit to Austria, authorities said Tuesday.

The 68-year-old pontiff was not in danger during his five-day tour of this Alpine nation, which ended Monday. John Paul has survived two assassination attempts in his decade as leader of the world's Roman Catholics.
