

Troubled pasts affect choices of students

College students who have moved away from problem homes may feel as though they have left their pasts behind them. Not so, a Texas A&M psychologist said.

Possibly one-fourth of college students nationwide come from alcoholic or chemical-dependent families, and as few as 5 percent of those students understand how their pasts affect them in school, Dr. Mike Wilbourn said.

"One of the problems most intensely felt by students we call Adult Children of Alcoholics (ACOA) is the issue of compulsivity," Wilbourn said.

"They become so involved in academics they often exclude other things — like socialization," he said. "They get into difficult graduate programs or take very challenging undergraduate programs."

Although there are no statistics, evidence shows that these students are inclined to pursue high-pressure, high-profile professions like medicine, law or engineering, he said.

ACOA's often choose professions that affect many people although they have difficulty relating to other people.

Being an ACOA does not mean a life predestined to alcohol or substance abuse, but coping mechanisms learned at home make it difficult to relate in a healthy way to others, Wilbourn said.

Of the estimated 70 million Americans affected by alcoholism, 14 million are actual alcoholics.

For the estimated 25 percent of the students at A&M who are in some way affected by alcoholism, help is available through the Drug Prevention and Education Program and the ACOA support groups and therapy groups at the Student Counseling Service.

Anti-abortion group withdraws support of commissioner

AUSTIN (AP) — Railroad Commissioner John Sharp, a longtime abortion foe, lost the support of a major anti-abortion group Tuesday because of his active role in Michael Dukakis' presidential campaign.

Sharp is Texas campaign chairman for Dukakis, who was branded by the Texas Coalition for Life as "the most pro-abortion candidate ever to run for the U.S. presidency."

"We believe that Mr. Sharp has made a very serious moral and political mistake," said Bill Price of Dallas, director of the anti-abortion coalition that claims 100,000 members.

Sharp, while a state senator, sponsored a 1985 anti-abortion bill. The coalition backed him in his successful 1986 Railroad Commission race. But Price said at a Capitol news conference that the coalition would never back Sharp again.

He said he had given Sharp an ultimatum: reconsider his role in the Dukakis campaign or lose the support of anti-abortion groups. Sharp stuck with Dukakis, while maintaining his opposition to abortion.

"It is with regret that I must tell you that John Sharp will never again

receive pro-life backing in future political races," Price said. "His actions have led us to conclude that he is acting in a simply expedient and pragmatic manner, and that his commitment to the pro-life movement has been based upon political aspirations rather than on the principles which we thought we shared."

Sharp charged Tuesday that the anti-abortion group was "being used by the Republican Party" and had exaggerated Dukakis' record on abortion.

Price said Dukakis is a longtime supporter of elective abortion and public funding of abortions.

Sharp said he has not changed his position against abortion, but supports Dukakis because he thinks the Massachusetts governor "is a good man."

Price predicted Sharp's political future "has grown quite dim" because of his support for Dukakis.

"He will never be embraced by pro-abortion groups, because of his prior pro-life stand, and we will never be able to back him," Price said.


