ct director, said FDA testing failed to detect 33 pesticides with moderate to high risks for health problems such as cancer and birth defects.

Susan Shen, the OTA's residue pro-

ticides registered by the EPA.

She said the conclusion of the study was that FDA has "not allocated a lot of resources toward research to expand the number of pesticides they can detect.'

Gerald Vince, the FDA's district director in Dallas, said the problem is less than the critics perceive it to be. But he agreed the agency suffers from a shortage of resources.

'Based on resources that have been provided to FDA and the number of dollars and bodies allocated to the pesticide program, there is adequate protection being provided at this point," Vince told the Houston Post. "We could use more dollars and more people to expand what we are already doing.'' Vince said 35 chemists and microbio-

logists and 42 investigators and inspectors are responsible for checking the safety of domestic and imported food products in Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas.
