Lawyers argue about drugs in Delta case

DALLAS (AP) — An airline attorney said the government is wasting time presenting testimony about anti-anxiety and muscle-relaxant prescriptions for a Delta Flight 191 pilot because someone else was flying the jet when it crashed.

"To spend two weeks on an issue that could not possibly have been the cause of the accident is a waste of the court's time," Delta attorney John Martin said.

Delta says the co-pilot was flying the jet when it crashed Aug. 2, 1985, killing 137 people during an attempted landing during a thunderstorm at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

Government lawyers say the drug issue will take about two weeks to present.

Pharmacist Larry Thomas testified Monday he filled Captain Edward M. Connors' prescriptions for Stelazine, an anti-anxiety drug, and Robasin, a muscle relaxant, shortly before the crash.

Miami pharmacist Gerald Warshofsky, in a deposition presented to U.S. District Judge David O. Belew, said prescriptions he filled for Connors included the tranquilizer Valium and the painkiller Percodan.

Federal Aviation Administration attorney Mark Bury told the judge the government will attempt to prove that Connors also had been taking Dalmane, used to treat insomnia, and several antihistamines for long periods before the crash.

Attorney Alan Wilson, who represents Kathleen Connors, the captain's widow, told the judge, "(the drug issue) has done irreparable damage to a good man's reputation and has not been good for Mrs. Connors."

"The pain and anguish from seeing this reported in the paper is exceeded only by the pain and anguish of her husband's death," Wilson said.

Bury said the issue raises serious questions about Connors' judgment.

He noted that Connors did not disclose his use of the drugs to the FAA as required.

"He was supposed to report his entire medical history, and he did not," Bury told a reporter during a break in the trial. "Failure to do that is a felony. We prosecute people for failing to do that."

Delta attorney Maureen Murry said Connors had provided the government with enough information and the government could have obtained more if it wanted to.

The trial is being heard by Belew to determine responsibility for the crash.

Delta contends, among other things, that government employees did not provide the flight crew with adequate information about the thunderstorm as the doomed airliner approached the airport.

Woman, feline reunited after three years apart

DALLAS (AP) — After three years apart, Eleanor Kilgore and her black cat, Winston, are together again in time for Halloween.

"It's like he has been resurrected," Kilgore said Monday. "This is one cat that really has nine lives, I guess."

A telephone call from a woman Sunday afternoon persuaded Kilgore to drive 10 miles across town to see the cat that was wearing Winston's worn leather collar and metal identification tag.

"I hopped in the car with tears streaming down my face," Kilgore said.

Winston emitted a meow of relief as Kilgore picked him up for the first time since Feb. 16, 1986.

"I think he was as surprised and happy to see me as I was to see him," she said.

Kilgore, 55, said Winston looks no worse for wear and still weighs about 14 pounds and has a shiny, bushy coat.

But he has a few white hairs.

"He looks like a big black teddy bear," said Kilgore, a former model who runs a horse stable and frequently opens her home near White Rock Lake to neglected or abandoned pets.

Kilgore searched extensively for Winston.

She posted rewards, placed newspaper ads, checked regularly with animal shelters and asked residents if they had ever seen her cat.

She thought she had found Winston's fate about a week later when a city sanitation worker told her that a day after the cat disappeared, a black cat had been picked up.

"It broke my heart," she said. "I was absolutely devastated to think Winston had been crushed by a car and thrown into the garbage."

Sandy Odean said she and her husband had been feeding the black cat since they moved into their home in July.

She had not been able until Sunday to get close enough to the skittish feline to read its tag.
