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Hispanic voters get out, vote for Dukakis

EL PASO (AP) — More than half of Texas' registered Hispanic voters went to the polls and more than three-quarters of them voted for Michael Dukakis — a trend that some believe could overshadow bitter politics in the Lone Star State's future.

"In some counties, we may be having two parties — one brown, one white," said Dr. Bob Brischetto, executive director of the Southwest Voter Research Institute in San Antonio. "This well could be the beginning of a strong polarization along ethnic and party lines."

Officials caution that liberalized absentee-voting means it will be days before accurate estimates on Hispanic turnout are available. But Andy Hernandez, executive director of the Southwest Voter Registration Education Project, estimated Tuesday night that 650,000, or 55 percent, of the registered Hispanics voted in this year's election. In 1984, the figure was 49 percent, he said.

Exit polls by NBC and SVREP showed that 79 percent to 82 percent of Texas Hispanics voted for the Spanish-speaking Dukakis — higher than the 73 percent of Texas Hispanics who voted for Walter Mondale in 1984.

Such statistics held up even in conservative Lubbock County, said Maria Liza Mercado, vice chairman of the Mexican-American Democrats of Texas and an assistant state attorney general in Lubbock.

She said there was a backlash against Republican Party radio advertisements in the Rio Grande Valley in which an announcer warned in Spanish that officials will be watching for voting by non-citizens, and against Republican Secretary of State Jack Rains for sending poll-monitors to minority precincts.

"That does not invite a good view of the Republican Party," Mercado said.

Police look for robber of convenience store

On Sept. 21, the Student Corner Convenience Store located in the 1800 block of Welsh Street in College Station was the scene of an armed robbery.

At 8:15 p.m., a female customer entered the store and asked the clerk for an item to purchase. While the clerk was distracted, the robber revealed a small, nickel-plated revolver, threatened the clerk and demanded money from the cash register.

After taking an undetermined amount of cash in small bills, the woman fled the store and was last seen running north on Welsh Street.

Witnesses described the robber as a black female with dark complexion, about 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighing 150 pounds. She was wearing purple bandanna on her head, a colored T-shirt and dirty blue jeans.

Judge fines Valley bank for money laundering

BROWNSVILLE (AP) — A federal judge has fined Alamo Bank of Texas \$750,000 for drug-related currency violations committed by another Lower Rio Grande Valley bank before Alamo acquired it last year.

U.S. District Judge Filemon Vela said he was sending a warning to area financial institutions Tuesday when he assessed a \$250,000 fine on one count of failing to report currency transactions over \$10,000, and ordered Alamo to pay within 30 days.

He assessed \$500,000 on two other counts, but suspended those two fines and placed the bank on three years' probation.

He said that he feels he must do something that informs every financial institution in the Rio Grande Valley of the obligation to comply with federal currency laws designed to prevent money laundering.

The three were customers of the Pharr bank.

Alamo Bank was assessed the fine as successor to Central Bank of Pharr, after pleading no contest to three counts of failing to report cash transactions totaling \$1.78 million.

Fitch in early October said his bank was aware of the problems involving the cash transactions when it purchased the Pharr bank.

He said the transactions had been investigated by the Comptroller of currency.

He said the comptroller was by the Justice Department that should be dropped.

Later, an Internal Revenue probe of the transactions resulted in indictments.

Allen Shields said if the bank realized the potential liability would have delayed taking over Pharr bank.

He said the judge had noted the guilty party was not before the court that Alamo had merely inherited liability through the merger.

Alamo Bank officials, however, said they were preparing to appeal the decision.

"On appeal, we trust that the higher courts will agree with our position that justice will not be preserved if Alamo Bank is punished for a crime it did not commit," Allen Shields, bank president, said.

Jeffrey Fitch, senior vice president and cashier, said in a signed statement that he thought the court subjected an innocent party to heavy fines and public embarrassment.

Appeals court upholds death sentence of man

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday affirmed the murder conviction of Freddie Lee Webb, sentenced to death in the 1985 murder of Leopoldo Cantu in Corpus Christi. The court rejected Webb's appeal in a 7-1 decision.

Webb forced Elizabeth Cantu to safe, it said.

Cantu later was found shot to death. The opinion said he had been times, although only one was identified as fatal.

Several months later, Webb was apprehended as he fled the scene of the robbery, the opinion said.

Alamo Bank, based in the Lower Rio Grande Valley city of Alamo, last year acquired the Central Bank of Pharr, in the nearby city of Pharr.

Alamo was indicted on Dec. 15, 1987, on eight counts of currency transactions and conspiracy violations, as successor in interest to the bank it had acquired eight months earlier.

Among other grounds, Webb claimed the evidence failed to support the jury's verdict that he intentionally killed Cantu during a kidnapping.

Judge Sam Houston Clinton wrote the majority opinion.

Judge Marvin Teague dissented, and Judge Chuck Miller did not participate.

According to the opinion, Elizabeth Cantu worked her first shift as night supervisor of the Ship Ahoy Restaurant in Corpus Christi on Dec. 8, 1985.

The indictment charged that in 1983 and 1984, drug traffickers Juan Frank Garcia, Emilio Quintero-Payan and Juan Jose Quintero-Payan engaged in large-scale distribution of tons of marijuana,

She met her husband, Leopoldo, after work and they went to a car wash.

The two were accosted at the car wash by Webb and an accomplice, who forced them at gunpoint into the back seat of their Blazer, the opinion said.

They returned to the restaurant, where

Judge will determine result of contest won by dead man

AMARILLO (AP) — A judge will decide the outcome of a Potter County commissioner's race won by a man who died in September yet gathered twice as many votes as his opponents.

Republican Paul Roberts died after the date passed for removal of names from ballots. In Tuesday's election, Roberts won 4,076 votes, while Democrat Jay Kirkman II collected 1,879 votes and write-in candidate Harold Cliver, also a Democrat, collected 521. The dead-man winner wasn't the only twist to the race. Kirkman is under indictment by a grand jury.

County Judge Elisha Demerson will decide who must fill Roberts' seat, originally left vacant when Republican Pat Cunningham retired.

Demerson can pick a replacement as late as Jan. 1, the *Amarillo Globe-News* reported.

Kirkman and Cliver attributed the unusual outcome to straight-ticket Republican voters.

"I think it's a trend down the whole ballot from the national ticket," Kirkman said. "Everybody voted straight Republican. I look down the ticket, and it's the same in every race."

Cliver said, "A lot of people just went in there and punched the 'R' button."

Vice President George Bush defeated Gov. Michael Dukakis handily in the county, one of the state's few where Republican Beau Boulter defeated incumbent Lloyd Bentsen in the U.S. Senate race.

Six days before the election, Bentsen was indicted by a Potter County jury on three misdemeanor charges, unlawful acceptance of campaign funds and unlawful expenditure of campaign funds. Each charge is punishable by up to a \$2,000 fine and a year in jail.

County Attorney Bill Baumgartner is prosecuting the case, said the indictment stems from accusations that Kirkman, 33, signed the name of his stepmother, Libby Anderson Kirkman, on campaign materials.

Kirkman said the dispute is an ugly squabble that has been escalating since he was elected in 1984. He said he could get Cliver elected and would get control of his deceased father's will.
