## State program guilty of fraud, newspaper says

AUSTIN (AP) — A year-long investigation by a special unit of the Texas attorney general's office uncovered Medicaid fraud and other illegal conduct in a state program to fund community homes for mentally retarded people, according to an internal report obtained by a newspaper

The Austin American-Statesman reported Thursday that investigators for the attorney general's Medicaid Fraud Control Unit found that some companies operating community homes have engaged in illegal "double dipping" by collecting state and Medicaid money to provide the same services to retarded people.

The investigators' confidential report, the newspaper said, also concludes that several former employees of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation signed contracts to receive state funds while still employed with the department.

At issue is the MHMR Department's multimillion-dollar program that provides \$20,294 a year for the care of retarded state school residents who move into community homes.

By the end of this fiscal year, the program will have spent about \$143 million since its inception. It will be serving an estimated 2,224 retarded people


