

Sources: Bush's budget raises education spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will propose more than \$250 million in education spending above former President Reagan's budget and will call for a tax break for adoptions, sources in the administration and congress said Wednesday.

The sources, who insisted upon anonymity, said the \$1.16 trillion spending plan Bush will outline in a nationally televised speech to Congress at 8 p.m. Thursday will project a deficit of roughly \$98 billion. That's within the \$100 billion requirement of a federal deficit-reduction law for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1 but some \$5.5 billion higher than Reagan had proposed.

Higher levels in the Bush budget for education, child care, the environment and the homeless account for some of the gap, the sources said. On the eve of Bush's budget ad-

dress, more glimpses of the president's \$1.16 trillion spending outline surfaced as administration budget officials briefed influential members of Congress on the package.

According to congressional and administration officials, key elements of Bush's package include:

- A request for \$250 million to \$300 million more than the \$21.2 billion Reagan had sought in education spending. Much of the increase would go to expand the Head Start program. Bush's plan for a \$500 million National Merit School program will be scaled back sharply, however.

- A tax break to help families recover some of the cost of adoptions, with an emphasis on hard-to-adopt children. During his campaign, Bush repeatedly said he was "for adoption, not abortion." A modest previous tax deduction to help offset adoption costs was eliminated in a

1986 tax-code overhaul. The source of the proposed tax break could not be learned.

- An increase of about \$350 million over the \$1.4 billion Reagan sought to clean up deteriorating clear weapons plants, along with a proposal to restart of the Idle Iron vannah River plant in South Carolina.

- The establishment of tax "urban enterprise zones" in cities.

- A freeze in military spending, the level of inflation for fiscal 1991 with a 1 percent increase over 1991 and a 2 percent increase in 1993. Reagan had proposed a 1 percent increase, after inflation, in fiscal 1990.

- A reduction in the capital-gains tax to a maximum of 15 percent on assets held more than two years, including works of art.

U.S. jet chartered by Italians crashes, 144 estimated dead

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — An American charter jet filled with Italian tourists slammed into a fog-covered mountain in the Azores today and exploded, and all 144 people on board are feared dead, officials and news reports said.

Maria della Versesi, a spokesman at the Italian Embassy in Lisbon, said all 137 passengers were Italian and the seven crew members were American. She did not release any names.

The aircraft belonged to the U.S. airline Independent Air Corp., based in Smyrna, Tenn.

The flight originated in Bergamo, Italy, and was to have proceeded to Puerto Plata in the Dominican Republic, and Montego Bay in Jamaica, after making a refueling stop in the Azores.

The Portuguese news agency LUSA quoted an unidentified official from the Azores Civil Protection Service as saying about 50 bodies had been recovered and it appeared all on board died.

LUSA also quoted an unidentified member of a local flying club as saying all the passengers and crew had been killed.

Afonso Pimentel, a LUSA reporter based in the Azores, said the Boeing 707 was preparing to land at Santa Maria airport when it crashed into Pico Alto, a fog-covered, 1,794-foot-high mountain, and burst into flames.

LUSA quoted the civil protection official as saying the pilot asked the airport to clear a runway for an emergency landing. The Civil Protection Service is a state body that provides rescue services and assistance in civilian emergencies.

A.L. Pittman, president of Independent Air Corp., said in an interview in Smyrna that the 15-year-old company makes 400 to 500 charter flights a year, mostly in the Caribbean and Europe.

Pittman, who declined to identify the seven American crew members, said the 20-year-old jetliner that crashed had a relatively low number of flight hours and no history of trouble.

Pittman said the airplane, one of two Boeing 707s owned by the company, had 12,500 cycles, or takeoffs and landings, and less than 50,000 hours in the air.

600,000 parishioners crowd Korean church for Christian services

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — While many churches are struggling to keep their doors open, the Yoido Full Gospel Church wrestles every week with the problems of accommodating 600,000 parishioners.

The Seoul church, part of the worldwide Assemblies of God, claims to have the largest congregation in the world. The church seats 25,000 worshippers in its main sanctuary and another 25,000 in 17 "overflow" chapels.

The church was established with five parishioners by Rev. Paul Yonggi Cho in 1958 amid the devastation left by the Korean War. Over the years it expanded into a massive organization still intent on getting bigger every year.

"People often ask why the church is so large," said Lydia Swain of Miami, an ordained minister who first came to Seoul in 1964 and now works in the church office.

The simple answer, she said, is that "people want to stay together, to pray together." She said the congregation, virtually all Korean, is made up of born-again Christians who believe the power of prayer is strongest in groups.

Coping with what the church calls

"a city of Christians" can be a test of ingenuity. There are 12 services a week, including seven on Sunday and nightly prayer meetings.

The faithful line up half an hour ahead of each service to cram into the 25,000-seat sanctuary. Thousands too late to get a seat jam into the overflow chapels to watch the proceedings on closed circuit television.

More than 30,000 children attend Sunday school classes in halls, crowded rooms and stairwells.

There are 12 choirs, 12 choir directors and 12 organists. Two orchestras play on Sunday.

"If you're 15 minutes early, you're late in this church," says Jim Dunnet, a church member from Great Falls, Mont., who lives in Seoul. "The seats are filled."

Church traffic police direct hundreds of cars and buses picking up and dropping off church-goers at every service.

Ushers hand out 500,000 printed church programs a week, and if one does not speak Korean, there are headsets to hear translation in up to five languages. Some of the congregation bring binoculars.

Plant thieves strip public desert of vegetation

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — The Bureau of Land Management is on the lookout for cactus and bush thieves who might not even know they're doing anything illegal by taking desert plants from public lands.

"I honestly think that nine out of 10 of these acts aren't malicious," said Diana "Punkie" Garretson, spokesman for the BLM in Las Cruces. "Someone just decides they want a cactus or a bush to decorate their front yard, so they dig it up and take it home. Most of them don't know it's illegal — they do not understand that it's wrong."

But taking away desert plants is wrong, Garretson said, because the land is fragile and it takes years for holes to fill up and vegetation to grow back. Plants keep the loose desert soil from washing away in flash floods and provide habitat for animals.

Each year the plant-theft problem becomes more no-

ticeable as cactus, sotols, yuccas, desert willows and other brush turn up missing from public lands, Garretson said.

In January, 50 desert willows were cut down and stolen from a gulley east of Las Cruces, said BLM ranger Margarita Guzman. She said a suspect was caught and will have to appear in U.S. District Court.

"We want people to know we are serious," Guzman said. "In the past, people thought the BLM was a lenient agency, but we're not."

First-time offenders caught abusing federal land are fined \$50, Guzman said. Repeat offenders appear before federal judges who have a lot of leeway in sentencing, Garretson said.

"Law enforcement in this area is new, but I think people will begin to see that this is very serious," Guzman said.
