WASHINGTON (AP) - Toxic industrial and sewage wastes pollute most of the nation's coastal waters. and the contamination will get worse without tighter pollution controls and curbs on coastal development, a private environmental group said Wednesday.

"We need to stop using our oceans as dumping grounds," said Bob Adler, one of the authors of a report on coastal water contamination.

The report by the Natural Resources Defense Council said that while attention has focused on medical wastes washing onto beaches. shoreline pollution is much broader and devastating with coastal waters in virtually every region of the country contaminated by bacteria, toxic chemicals, heavy metals, and sewage overflows.

"Each year our factories dump no less than 5 trillion gallons of waste-water into coastal waters," said the report, entitled Ebb Tide for Pollut-

"We flush another 2.3 trillion gallons of sewage into them. And every time it rains or snows, massive amounts of poisonous substances, including gasoline and pesticides, are carried into the sea as runoff from our city streets and farms."

The report, which examined a variety of ocean pollutants, suggested

the study, said a combination of separate legislation before Congress could produce a turnaround if enacted into law. But she conceded the battle against ocean pollution could be expensive - into the tens of billions of dollars — and also require curbs on coastal development.

"I don't think we can pretend that it's not going to cost." she told a news conference

The resources council said it had developed no precise cost figures, but that just the cost of improving sewage treatment facilities could be \$8 billion to \$16 billion. About one-fourth of all sewage

wastewater "is dumped directly into coastal waters" and much more is released into rivers and eventually reaches the ocean, the report said. Medical waste on beaches, which

attracted widespread attention last summer, continues to be a problem. the report said.

zone the Israelis control just north of the border. Five Israeli soldiers and a member of the allied South Lebanon Army

militia were reported wounded. Uri Lubrani. Israel's coordinator for south Lebanon, said on Middle East Television the Israelis would retaliate, but did not say when or how.

'Israel will deal with the Hezbollah as it deals with all the organizations which threaten the normal life of the security zone," he said. "Violence has two edges and Israel will retaliate in one way or another . . . in due time, in a place it will choose."

Israeli commandos abducted Obeid, 33, and two aides from the southern Lebanon village of Jibchit on July 28. Israel has offered to trade him and its estimated 300-400 Shiite prisoners for three Israeli soldiers held in Lebanon and the Western hostages.

The Zionist enemy has suffered a bitter dismay because of his failure to achieve his objectives from the crime of abducting Sheik Abdul Karim Obeid." said a statement-issued

ter. "It is clear that things have backfired adversely on the enemy after this foolish crime," the statement said. "It has become impossible to release the Israeli POWs and all ways for a possible swap have been

blocked. 'Moreover, the refusal of the enemy to release Sheik Obeid and his two relatives, and his linkage of the problem of the Zionist POWs with that of the hostages, might hurt the West and further complicate the hostage issue."

The statement said "efforts for the release of the Western hostages in Lebanon are passing through their greatest setback because of the foolhardiness committed by the racist Zionists who appear perfectly willing to sacrifice all others for their selfish interests. Hezbollah said the West should

force Israel to free Obeid, and described Israel's claims about statements the cleric made under interrogation as "false and misleading






