A&M becomes first to implement GTE's SmartPark network in region

A formal agreement between cust exas A&M University and GTE lays. uthwest was reached in August, aking the A&M Research Park the rst in the region to implement TE's SmartPark telecommunicans network.

"College Station is an ideal site for esearch-related businesses," Texas &M President William H. Mobley id. "The park's proximity to the niversity and the ability to provide vanced communications services our tenants will be a key factor in success of the park.

SmartPark was developed in 1985 nage the diverse telecommunicaon needs of large real estate develments such as business, industrial, nd research parks.

node to provide highly specialized services to their customers, and can be expanded without retrofitting equipment or inconveniencing the customer with enormous time de-

There are 22 SmartPark networks currently in operation at business parks located in California, Florida, Indiana, North Carolina and Wash-

ington.
"One important advantage of SmartPark, in addition to providing enhanced telecommunications capabilities, is that it is targeted to meet a customer's needs today, as well as in the future," GTE Southwest Area Coordinator for Communications Wanda Nicols said.

'SmartPark enables GTE to pro-GTE California to specifically vide cost-effective service to heavy communications users in a centralized location," recently retired GTE Southwest President E.L. "Buddy" Langley stated in a press release. The system utilizes a fiber optic "GTE Southwest is pleased to team

with a high technology facility like the Research Park for the introduc-tion of SmartPark to the Southwest."

"The partnership we have formed with Texas A&M University Research Park provides an excellent opportunity for GTE Southwest to demonstrate our sophisticated capa-

bilities in voice, data, and video communications," Langley said.

A&M and GTE will cooperate in marketing the new system in order to attract tenants and encourage further development of the park. Present tenants of the 434-acre facility include the Granada Corporation, a biotechnology firm; the Offshore Technology Research Center of the National Science Foundation; and the National Training Center for the U.S. Department of Agriculture

Food Safety and Inspection Service. A fourth building was recently dedicated and will be used to conduct research in deep oceanic oil






