But the most sincere form of flattery in the music business is when musicians ask you to sit in with them. And Bellson is much in demand.

When trumpeter Clark Terry put together "Clark Terry and Friends" for this year's JVC Jazz Festival here, Bellson and pianist Oscar Peterson were the friends he chose for his final set. Bellson's wife since 1952,

Pearl Bailey, was in the audience.
In 1946, Bellson got the idea of using twin bass drums. His simultaneous manipulation of two bass drums at incredible speed is one of the most exciting and popular fea-tures of his drumming — used both for spectacular effect and musical validity.


