Austin cops ban vehicles on Sixth St.

AUSTIN (AP) — Motorists will be banned, temporarily at least, from Austin's Sixth Street as police experiment with a project to reduce weekend congestion on the nightclub strip.

"This is to alleviate the mess we have with people cruising down Sixth Street," Lt. Juan Gonzalez said of the pilot project that will run for the next two weekends.

Bumper to bumper traffic often stretches down Sixth Street and clogs the west frontage road of Interstate 35. Pedestrian traffic along the sidewalks is just as congested.

"The sidewalks get so crowded that groups can't stay together," said Police Capt. Ruben Lopez. "Then somebody tries to squeeze through the crowd and elbows somebody, and before you know it you've got a fight."

With no vehicles on East Sixth Street, pedestrians will be able to use the street as well as the sidewalks for club-hopping, police said.

Danny Shea, co-owner of the Maggie Mae's club, said Sixth Street business owners he knows are willing to try the plan.

Jury still hung in Lubbock bank fraud case

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — The jury is hung up in the bank-fraud trial of D.L. "Danny" Faulkner and six others, and the judge has urged them to try to arrive at a partial verdict, a defense attorney said today.

Defendants and attorneys from both sides met for about five minutes this morning in the chambers of U.S. District Judge Sam Cummings, but no one would comment on the nature of the meeting. The judge has imposed a gag order.

Both sides met with Cummings twice for a total of about 35 minutes Wednesday. Everyone involved, including the judge and Assistant U.S. Attorney Terry Hart, was mum on the subject of the conferences.

The jury has been deliberating since Aug. 23 on the 88-count indictment that accuses the defendants of conspiring to steal \$135 million from savings and loans. The defendants are accused of defrauding the thrifts through fanciful appraisals and sham real-estate transactions on condominium-zoned land along Interstate 30 east of Dallas.

One defense attorney, speaking on the condition of anonymity, would not disclose the nature of the talks with the judge, but said Cummings has asked the deadlocked jury to arrive at a "partial verdict." The attorney would not comment on whether that meant finding some defendants guilty and some innocent, or finding them all guilty on some counts and innocent on others.

Officials said jurors were planning to meet a half-day today and leave at 1 p.m. for personal matters.

MSC's College Bowl offers challenge to trivia experts

Are you a walking encyclopedia? Is Trivial Pursuit too easy? If so, then the MSC College Bowl may be the challenge you have been waiting for.

Demonstrations were held Wednesday and Thursday in the MSC Flag Room to announce open registration for a College Bowl intramural tournament to begin on Oct. 4.

The demonstration was held between two teams of four made up of MSC Nova and Cepheid Variable members, as well as people from the audience.

Public Relations Chairman Phillip Sulak said that the College Bowl's motto is, "The varsity sport of the mind."

Sulak explained that the game consists of two seven-and-a-half minute rounds in which the teams must answer questions covering a wide range of topics. The teams are asked a 10-point toss up question followed by a bonus question of a specified value, Sulak said. Sulak said that a player must be acknowledged by the judge before answering a question.

Sulak said the upcoming tournament will be a double elimination competition to determine the champion and an additional four to eight outstanding participants. A regional team of four players and an alternate will be selected from the group of champions.

"Generally, teams either are diverse — with different kinds of natures — or there are some teams that have one person who's really good and he carries them," Sulak said.

"Generally, teams with better nicknames do better because they took the time, they care enough to think of a good name."

Texas A&M has participated in College Bowl, which started in the 1950s as a television game show, for over 10 years and has finished second at the national level, Sulak said.

Chairman Lore Guilmartin said that A&M has the largest intramural tournament among participating universities.

Texas DHS board adopts conflict-of-interest policy

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Department of Human Services board tentatively adopted a tough conflict-of-interest policy for firms that want to do business with the agency.

The six-member panel Wednesday unanimously approved a proposal requiring such firms to disclose any connections to current and former agency officials and employees.

Board Chairman Rob Mosbacher Jr. said the policy should take effect later this year, after a public hearing and final board approval.

"It's tough, but I think it's fair, and I think it's the right thing to do," Mosbacher said. "This policy goes farther than the Legislature proposed. It may provide some leadership to the rest of state government."

DHS Commissioner Ron Lindsey said the policy threatens renewal of some contracts and "may cause some hardships."

"But we are trying to comply with what the Legislature wants, as clearly and openly as we can," he said.

The policy was prompted by a provision in the state appropriations bill to scrutinize contracts of the agency. Lawmakers were critical of a practice that allowed department employees to do business with DHS as soon as they quit the agency.

A list prepared in August showed 38 current and former officials and employees, including Mosbacher, had some association with agency contracts. Officials said they found no indication of collusion or impropriety in the way those contracts had been awarded.

The list noted Mosbacher was a board member of the Greater Houston Area Chapter of the American Red Cross, which has a department contract.

Mosbacher told the board his connection was only an indirect tie from which he had not profited. He said he was not aware the Red Cross chapter had a department contract until it showed up on the list, and he resigned the Red Cross post to avoid any conflict.
