# NFC hopes for continued AFC dominance

A couple of years ago, after Washington beat Denver 42-10 in the Suer Bowl, Jim Finks was asked why he NFC had been so dominant.

"It's the swing of the pendulum," aid the president of the New Oreans Saints and the commissioner--waiting. "In the '70s it was the AFC. It may go back the other way Not the way 1989 is starting.

Not only has the NFC now won six

traight Super Bowls, but it's clearly ome the dominant conference rom top to bottom, unlike in the past, where the bottom of the NFC ontained the NFL's weakest teams. They are one reason the AFC has on the season series seven straight ears, including 30-22 last season.

But two weeks into 1989, the NFC as won all six games against the AFC, outscoring its rivals 171-93.

In fact, it could be argued that nly the Cincinnati Bengals (who ost 17-14 at Chicago in its intraconrence game) measure up in peranel to the top six or seven NFC ams - the Bears, 49ers, Vikings, agles, Rams, Giants and even the 0-Redskins.


