Crop Walk to hold informational meeting

Lee Widdison, one of the three Crop Walk coordinators, said last year's event raised \$5,000. 'We're going to try to double it

this year if we can," he said. Widdison said 25 percent of the money raised will go the the Brazos Church Pantry, which is run by 24 local churches. Last year the pantry fed more than 9,000 Bryan-College Station residents, he said.

'All the money is used primar-

ily for feeding, supplying fresh water and providing teaching materials," Widdison said.

Protests may delay granting of license to greyhound track

AUSTIN (AP) — The issuing of a lucrative greyhound wagering li-cense for Galveston County, the subject of continuing controversy and protest, may be delayed, the Texas Racing Commission said Thursday.

Bill Meincke, commission executive secretary, said a final order granting the gambling permit to Lone Star Greyhound Park Inc. likely would be held up pending an appeal by groups which lost the licensing competition.

"Although the commission is not

precluded from signing the final or-Meincke said, a hearing officer has recommended placing the appeal and final order on the agenda of the commission's Oct. 9 meeting.

The commission selected Lone

Star Greyhound Park in July but hasn't formally awarded it the li-

Greyhound experts have said the Galveston County track could become the biggest money-making dog track in the United States.

Two weeks ago, commissioners ignored the recommendation of their staff attorneys and refused to delay the final award to Lone Star, a group of Texas and Alabama investors that wants to build the track in La Mar-

Commission lawyers had urged a

delay to give investigators more time to check allegations that Lone Star had sabotaged a competitor's appli-

Last week, a rival group—Galve-ton Greyhound Racing Association — filed a motion to halt issuance of the final license order and to reope the hearing.

Hearing officer Holly Noelle denied that motion Friday. On Mor-day, Galveston Greyhound filed at appeal and requested that it placed on the agenda of the Racing Commission's October meeting.
