

Richards survives quake unscathed

AUSTIN (AP) — State Treasurer Ann Richards was caught in the earthquake which shook San Francisco Tuesday, but escaped unharmed, according to a statement released from her gubernatorial

campaign office. A violent earthquake rocked Northern California during the rush hour, caving in a section of the San Francisco Bay Bridge and delaying the third game of the World Series for at least a day.

Richards, a Democratic candidate for governor, was walking down a San Francisco street when she saw a large granite building start swaying, according to the press release.


