# Oilers demolish Steelers 27-0; team now tied for division lead

HOUSTON (AP) — A day after Coach Jerry Glanville was bitten by a poisonous snake, the Houston Oilers gave Pittsburgh a taste of their own kind of venom.

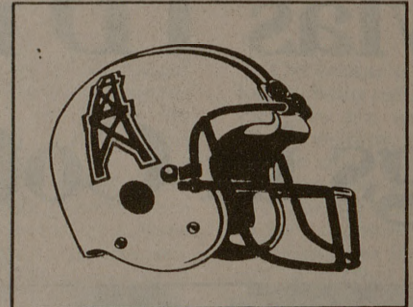
Warren Moon threw three touchdown passes in the first half, two to Alonzo Highsmith, and Houston's defense held Pittsburgh to 132 total yards en route to a 27-0 victory Sunday and the Oilers' first shutout since 1980.

The win, coupled with Cincinnati's 23-12 loss to Indianapolis, gave Houston (4-3) a tie with the Bengals for the AFC Central Division lead.

"We played well and made turnovers happen," said rookie safety Bubba McDowell, who intercepted two passes. "Coach Glanville told me on Monday that I couldn't make any more rookie mistakes."

Glanville was bitten on his right foot by a poisonous water moccasin on Saturday and underwent treatment at a hospital. The coach showed up at the Astrodome on crutches, but discarded them when he came onto the field.

Glanville and Noll, who have

The Oilers' last shutout came on Dec. 20, 1980, when they beat Pittsburgh 6-0. The Steelers (3-4) have won three of their last four.

Quarterback Todd Blackledge, replacing injured Bobby Brister, was able to guide the Steelers to just 21 first-half yards, and Pittsburgh had only 42 at the start of the fourth quarter.

"They came out and stung us pretty good," Blackledge said. "We just couldn't move the football. They came to play and we didn't execute." "Our game plan wasn't working," Blackledge said. "We wanted to keep getting after them. It was fun to watch it. Any time you get a shutout and you run the ball and throw a touchdown pass, you're a happy person."

The Oilers scored on four of their five first-half possessions and took a 24-0 halftime lead.

Moon's three first-half touchdown passes went to Highsmith for 3 and 11 yards and 51 yards to Curtis Duncan. Tony Zendejas also kicked a 45-yard field goal.

# Cowboys lose 36-28, drop to 0-7

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — A team record 33 carries, and Christian Okoye is still looking to hit his stride. What about 40?

"I did it in college," the big Kansas City fullback said.

Horst gained 170 yards and scoring twice against the NFL's worst rushing defense as the Chiefs beat Dallas 36-28 Sunday and handed the Cowboys their seventh straight loss.

"I don't think I'm in peak form," said Okoye. "I'm still learning. Nobody can stop learning the game of football."

The Chiefs, 3-4, make no attempt to disguise the fact that Okoye is going to get the ball, but it doesn't seem to matter to the AFC's leading rusher at 709 yards.

"I come back to the huddle and I look at the guys and I can tell they're all fired up," Okoye said.

The Chiefs scored four touchdowns on the ground in a game for the first time since Dec. 12, 1976 and gained 202 yards rushing, their most since Oct. 10, 1984.

The Chiefs took a 27-14 lead at halftime and went up 36-14 before the Cowboys tacked on two belated touchdowns in the fourth period.

"Defensively, we didn't play with the emotion of last week — we didn't play well, especially against a big guy like Okoye," said linebacker Eugene Lockhart. "We got some good hits on him and he was hurting a little bit, but we didn't hit him enough."

"We knew exactly what he was going to do. They did just what we practiced for, we just couldn't stop them."

The Cowboys hurt themselves with penalties and struggled on offense most of the game until putting together two long scoring drives in the fourth quarter that left them with their most points in a game since Dec. 21, 1987.

"We made too many mistakes," Coach Jimmy Johnson said. "We had a chance to win, but we've got so many new people. We were scrambling most of the game. Out of 47 guys, I guess 24 are new."

Okoye scored on touchdown runs of 2 and 13 runs in the first quarter but Paul Palmer answered with a 63-yard run for Dallas. Palmer is a former first-round draft choice of Kansas City signed this week by Dallas.

"I was taunting the (Kansas City) coaching staff a little bit," he said. "My fiancee said, 'Now, they'll know what it's like to hold their breath every time you carry the ball.' I felt like that today. It felt good to get the touchdown against the Chiefs' defense because they're exceptional against the run."

Former Cowboys quarterback Steve Pelluer, acquired earlier this week by the Chiefs, also played against his former team and scored on a 5-yard run that gave Kansas City a 36-14 lead with 2:21 left in the third quarter.

"It was fun to be able to score," Pelluer said. "Playing against my team, I think gave me mixed emotions."

to allow Baylor into the endzone. The Bears had to settle for three field goals, and were turned back three times after penetrating the Aggies' 15-yard line.

A&M linebacker William Thomas combined with safeties Gary Jones and Larry Horton to record 30 tackles. Cornerback Mickey Washington harassed Baylor quarterback Brad Goebel, sacking him twice.

The difference in the game though, was decided by Teaff and the officials.

Late in the third quarter, Baylor had driven to the A&M three-yard line. After failing to get into the endzone, Teaff decided to go for the

touchdown on fourth and goal with the Bears on top, 8-0.

But the Aggies' defense turned Baylor away. Thomas and Jones hit running back Lincoln Coleman in the Baylor backfield for a two-yard loss.

"If I had to do it all over again, I would have kicked a field goal," Teaff said. "I felt like we needed more points, so that's why I did what I did."

It was the official's call that led to A&M's first touchdown, though.

After shutting down the A&M's defense, Baylor failed to convert on a third down and Rutter booted an 80-yard punt.

But Baylor was called for clipping, and Sloucm decided to let the Bears kick it again.

"If we took the penalty and fumbled the return, it wouldn't have been such a great call," Sloucm said.

Instead, Rutter fumbled the snap

on the second punt attempt and Crooms fell on the ball in the end zone.

"The clipping call on Jeffery Murray had to be something the referees were really looking for," Teaff said. "It made a big difference in the game because A&M went from having the ball on the 20 to having a touchdown."

"I didn't see it, but the officiating crew saw what they saw."

After an insurance field goal in the fourth quarter, Baylor seemed to have the game in hand with 4:48 remaining.

But Pavlas, who had a miserable day — completing only 7 of 22 passes for 55 yards and throwing two interceptions — came through with the big 34-yard gain on third down.

"I thought it could've been the last time we touched the ball," Pavlas said. "They had been dropping off in coverage all day, so when I saw the seam, I took off."

Five plays later, Pavlas gave the Aggies six more points. After the two-point conversion, A&M led 14-11 with 1:00 remaining in the game.

However, the Bears weren't through yet.

After returning the kickoff on their own 49, Baylor completed one pass for six yards before stalling.

Teaff sent kicker Jeff Ireland out to attempt a 60-yard field goal. He had a 20-mile per hour wind at his back.

"Before the game, I saw (Ireland) kicking some 50-yards," Sloucm said. "As the ball headed toward the goalpost, I was saying a few prayers."

A&M cornerback Kevin Smith thought the Bears might be up to something tricky, though.

"They had their quarterback (Goebel) in there, so I thought it was going to be a fake," Smith said. "(Ireland) almost made it."

Almost, but not quite. The kick had the distance, but flew wide at the last moment and missed the crossbar by two feet.

The win keeps the Aggies in contention for the SWC championship and a Cotton Bowl appearance.

Sloucm and Teaff both said the conference race is so tight this year, more than one SWC loss would eliminate a team from the championship.

"I really like A&M's chances," Teaff said. "After our game, they have only one road game left (against Rice)."

Sloucm said he was pleased at the team's ability to stay calm and perform under pressure.

"If we would have panicked, there it would have ended up the same as the Tech game," Sloucm said. "Winning games like this builds a team's character."

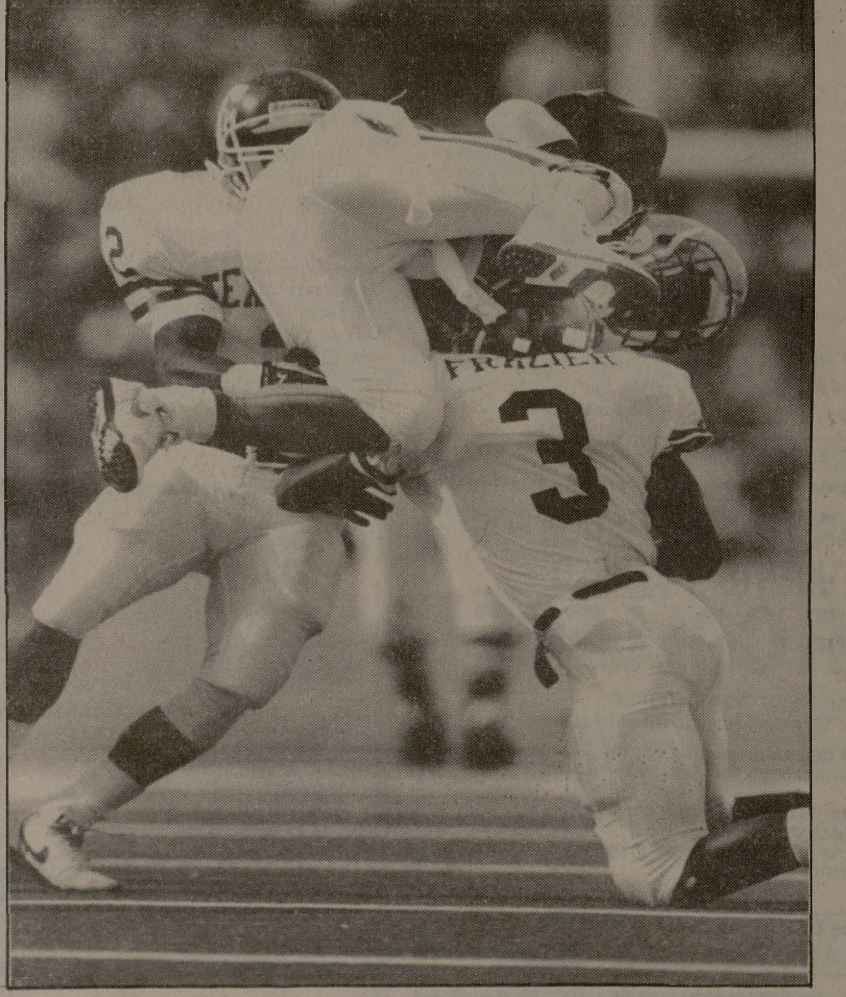
