## Fuel tanker runs aground, spilling cargo near Alaska

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) — A tanker carrying mixed fuels ran aground in a narrow channel of water between offshore islands, spilling between 20,000 and 35,000 gallons of gasoline, the Coast Guard said.

The M.V. Frank H. Brown slammed into Burnt Island reef about 18 miles south of Petersburg in southeastern Alaska around 8 p.m. (11 p.m. CST) Saturday, said Lt. Rick Janelle in Juneau. One tank containing up to 43,000 gallons of gasoline was ruptured but the leak was stopped by about 10 p.m. (1 a.m. CST), Janelle said.

Ed Moreth, another Coast Guard spokesman, said the vessel refloated itself in the Wrangell Narrows, as the body of water is called, about 8:30 a.m. (11:30 a.m. CST) Sunday.

"That was right around high tide, and that's what we were shooting for," Moreth said.

The grounding is the second major tanker accident in Alaska waters in the past 10 months, but far less serious than the previous one.

On March 24, the tanker Exxon Valdez piled into a charted reef in Prince William Sound, releasing nearly 11 million gallons of North Slope crude oil into the waters.

Exxon Corp. says it has spent more than \$1 billion cleaning up what amounted to the nation's largest oil spill. The thick crude oil is far less likely to dissipate than the gasoline that spilled Saturday.

Gasoline "does dissipate faster than most oil products," Moreth said. "We expect a lot of it has evaporated or has broken up. That's what we're looking for."

He said poor weather prevented the Coast Guard from sending out a helicopter to inspect the site from the air. Three Coast Guard cutters were on scene, however, and they were conducting a surface check to determine the extent of the spill, Moreth said.

The vessel has been surrounded by booms to contain any further leakage.

The owner has hired divers to inspect the outside of the vessel, and

the Coast Guard will board the vessel to inspect the inside to see if any other cargo tanks have been damaged, he said.

The owner has hired a tug and barge to remove what fuel remains aboard the tanker, Moreth said.

The tanker, owned by White Pine Transportation of Vancouver, British Columbia, carries 1.8 million gallons of mixed fuels.

## Houston radio stations drop controversial ads

HOUSTON (AP) — All six radio stations selected to run commercials aimed at limiting immigration have dropped the advertisements that sparked controversy from minority groups shortly after they began last week.

The ads linked immigrants to such problems as homelessness, drug smuggling and traffic congestion.

"In human history, it is not unusual for some to look for a scapegoat when problems cannot be adequately solved," said the Most Rev. Enrique San Pedro, auxiliary bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Galveston-Houston. "Homelessness, drugs and other social ills are due to our failure to confront their root causes, which is not immigration."

The three radio commercials — paid for by the Washington-based Federation for American Immigration Reform — began airing Wednesday as a test for a national campaign, Dan Stein, FAIR executive director, said.

Outraged Hispanic groups, including the League of United Latin American Citizens, threatened to boycott the stations and their sponsors. Catholic, Jewish and Chinese groups called the messages racist, divisive and insulting.

By Friday, the six stations airing the commercials had canceled them well short of the planned two-week run that would have ended Jan. 31.

"We have a higher standard in Houston," City Council Member Ben Reyes said. "They picked the

wrong city."

FAIR officials contend the commercials are not racist and say they are being denied their right to run a political issue — namely walled immigration into the United States should be reduced.

"These are very rational themes," Stein said. "There is a censorship issue here. If we're not on the air, our message is not getting out."

In the ads, authors complain about the millions of immigrants pouring into the country each year, and how it's wronging the city.

But hard-fought by Stein, the ads are being denied their right to run a political issue — namely walled immigration into the United States should be reduced.

"These are very rational themes," Stein said. "There is a censorship issue here. If we're not on the air, our message is not getting out."

that problems like traffic, homelessness and drug smuggling will get worse if the tide of immigrants isn't stemmed.

Stein said the ads are intended to urge people to get politically active to protest legislation proposing increased immigration levels.

"It's a blow for democratic politics in Houston," Stein said of the ads' cancellation. "We're going to get the ads back on." He said the group would try to again broadcast the ads in Houston "after things cool off."
