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
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
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Last year's stars come home

Former Aggies return to Olsen and get in shape

Even as the 1990 season begins Friday, 11 former Aggie players have returned to Olsen Field to start getting in shape for professional baseball's spring training, which starts in a few weeks. Eight of the 11 players were from last year's 58-7 A&M team, including

outfielder Kirk Thompson, second baseman Terry Taylor, shortstop Chuck Knoblauch, third baseman John Byington, first baseman Mike Easley, and pitchers Anthony DeLa-Cruz, Tim Hermann and Keith Lan-

Also coming back were third baseman Scott Livingstone and pitchers Rob Swain and Sherman Corbett.

All have been drafted by professional teams, and still are trying to

break into the major leagues.

However, Knoblauch has been invited to the Minnesota Twins' major league spring training, and Livingston has been invited to the Detroit Tigers' spring training. Both will have the chance to break into the majors this season.

The only thing preventing Knob-lauch and Livingstone the chance of breaking into the majors, Cannon said, is the ongoing possibility that owners will hold a lockout of spring training next week.

Owners have said they will not start spring training as scheduled next Thursday unless players agree to an outline for revenue sharing. Both sides met earlier this week, but failed to come up with a compromise for the 28th time

Now they take that third-place

The Lady Aggies travel north to play Southern Methodist Saturday at Moody Coliseum.

With a 84-70 win over the Lady Horned Frogs at G. Rollie White, A&M has inched its way closer to the top of the SWC standings.
