Ryan flirts with sixth no-hitter in Texas win

ARLINGTON — Nolan Ryan was on the trail of his sixth career no-hit-ter Monday night in front of a sell-out crowd of 40,907 at Arlington Stadium.

But it wasn't to be for Ryan. He tired after five innings and was re-moved after throwing 90 pitches. He allowed four walks while striking out four, and was relieved by Mike Jef-

Ryan, 43, picked up 290th career win, as the Rangers moved by the Toronto Blue Jays, 4-2. Ryan pitched only once in spring





Vikings release veteran Kramer

EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP) Tommy Kramer, ranked either fir or second in every major passing ar-egory for the Minnesota Viking, was released by the NFL team at his request on Monday.

Kramer, the Vikings' first-roun draft pick from Rice University 1977 and at 35 the Vikings older player on offense, said Genera Manager Mike Lynn told him that he probably would be no better that the team's third-string quarterbac this season.

He said Lynn had told him that Wade Wilson again would be the N 1 quarterback and that Rich Ga non, 24, who was acquired from Net England in 1987 in exchange for Minnesota's fourth-and 11th-round picks in the 1988 draft, would get a shot at the No. 2 spot.

"I've enjoyed my time with the Vikings," Kramer said in a statement released by the Vikings. "I don' want to retire just yet. I'm looking forward to a new challenge and hope to get an opportunity to learn and operate a new system. It should be interesting after so many years with the Vikings

Kramer couldn't be reached immediately for further comment. Kramer, a 13-year veteran wh was the Vikings starting quarterbac from 1979 until the last couple o years, was one of 13 Vikings left un protected from Plan B free agenc in February

Plan B players who had not signed by April 1 and still had contracts re verted back to their former clubs un der their old contracts.

Kramer had one year left or signed last year, which would have paid him about \$1 million this sea son. The Vikings are now free of that obligation.
