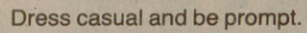

Publication names U.S. drug agents

DALLAS (AP) — A Mexican magazine's publication of the names of U.S. drug agents does not signal government disapproval of American actions, Attorney General Richard Thornburgh said Monday.

The weekly news magazine Proceso on Sunday published a list of 49 names it identified as being U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration attachés, assistant attachés and agents in Mexico.

The magazine published the list as part of a set of articles on the DEA's role in Mexico, which periodically causes controversy, most recently over the alleged abduction of a murder suspect to face charges in the United States.

In Dallas Monday for a speech to business executives, Thornburgh said the publication was not a reflection of government opinion.

Thornburgh said he met with his Mexican counterpart last week, and received assurances that Mexico still considered drug enforcement a high priority.

"If there is any escalation of ill feeling, it would obviously represent the views of that publication," Thornburgh said.

The Proceso article was accompanied by a story about the recent arrest of Dr. Humberto Alvarez Machain in El Paso on April 3, on charges in the death of Enrique Camarena, a U.S. drug agent kidnapped and tortured in Mexico.

The 42-year-old doctor is charged with injecting Camarena with stimulants to keep him alive while he was being tortured by drug traffickers.

Alvarez's lawyer said he was kidnapped from his offices in Guadalajara and delivered to DEA agents in El Paso.

Officials gear campaign toward uninsured drivers

AUSTIN (AP) — As many as one in four Texas motorists is disobeying the state law requiring mandatory liability insurance coverage, the state's consumer advocate said Monday.

"In some Texas cities and counties, the problem of uninsured motorists is one of truly epidemic proportions, with estimates as high as 70 percent noncompliance with the law," said Kay Doughty, state public counsel.

Doughty, who heads the state Office of Consumer Protection, said the problem is a serious one for consumers because, "In the end, it is the insured motorist who ends up picking up the tab through higher (insurance policy) premiums."

To help combat the growing problem, Doughty's office, Texas law enforcement agencies and others are launching a statewide educational campaign to alert motorists to the insurance requirements.

"It will target responsible, law-abiding drivers who for various reasons do not have the required insurance," she said.

"Our goal is to convey the message that driving is a privilege, not a constitutional right, and it carries with it some responsibilities, such as passing the driver's exam, keeping a car in good shape and the registration current, and purchasing liability

insurance," Doughty said.

In 1981, the Legislature passed the compulsory auto insurance law requiring minimum liability limits per accident of \$20,000 for bodily injury or death of one person, \$40,000 for bodily injury or death of two or more people, and \$15,000 in damage to property of others.

A first-time violation brings a \$10 fine, with subsequent violations pun-

ishable by fines of at least \$200. Suspension of a driver's license also is possible in the subsequent offenses.

Officials said that before the law was passed, 26 percent of Texas motorists were uninsured.

In the months after the law took effect, that number fell to as low as 15 percent, but it has risen steadily since and now has returned to almost the same levels as before the law was passed.
