AUSTIN (AP) — Fredericksburg is attracting top horses to its second session of pari-mutuel racing starting today, and track officials are promising less time in betting lines.

The horses are coming from New Mexico, Oklahoma, Louisiana and Texas because their owners want part of the \$100,000 Quarter Horse of Texas Breeders Sales Futurity, the biggest pari-

mutuel race ever run in the state.

Trials begin today with the final race scheduled July 22.

The winning horse earns \$30,000, and the other nine finishers also take home part of the \$100,000 purse. About 50 horses are entered in the trials, with their owners posting a \$1,500 en-
