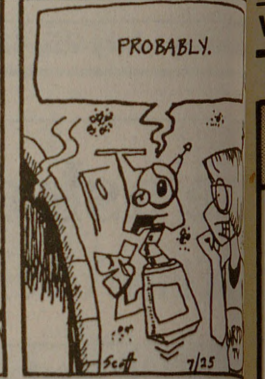

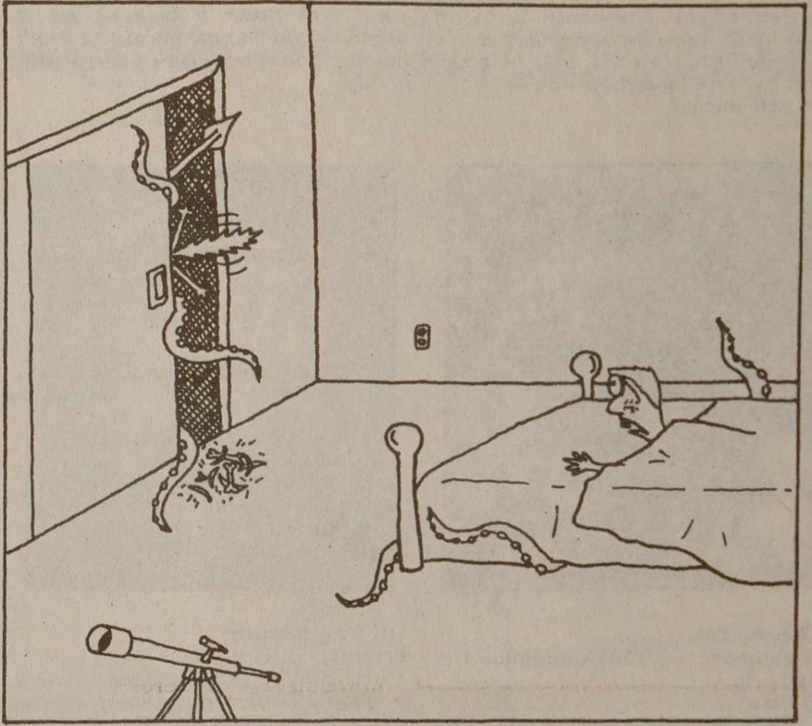

Government offers Japanese tips for relaxing

TOKYO (AP) — The government, concerned that the one of the industrious Japanese have yet to master is how to relax, is offering advice on how hard workers can become happy campers. The Health and Welfare Ministry this week released a 38-page report titled: "A Study on How to Take Proper Rest and Recuperation." It suggests Japanese forget about the jobs when they leave the office and take leisurely and lengthy vacations concepts well-rooted in the West. Have yet to take hold here. To help the nation relax, the government report offers a wide range of general guidelines. For example, it argues that constant overtime work cuts down on sleep, adversely affects the quality of work and results in "chronic fatigue, physically and mentally, eventually leading to bad health and illness." The report advises workers to go to bed early and get up early, eat breakfast without fail, forget about the job after hours (and eat dinner with their families....) White-collar Japanese workers often eat and drink with colleagues after leaving the office and do not go home until late at night. According to government statistics, Japanese workers are on the job an average of 2,150 hours a year, compared with 1,924 hours in the United States and 1,655 hours in West Germany. Japanese typically use only their allotted vacation time and are so reluctant to take time off that government last year was forced to throw in a fourth official holiday during the spring "Golden Week" to get people to stay out of their offices. The report also criticizes the typical Japanese worker vacations. Too many people go on vacation during the peak seasons, leading to exhausted vacationers and rush hour traffic at domestic resorts and on highways, the report said. To make vacations more relaxing, the ministry urges Japanese to take a leisurely pace instead of running from place to place and "to cancel their holidays around families and friends instead of the company job." It said Japanese should take the annual vacations at times other than the national holidays and should get away from the office for a few weeks at a time instead of a few days. Reiko Tomizawa of the Japan Travel Bureau, a huge travel agency, acknowledged that for many workers such concepts of relaxation have yet to sink in. Workers tend to think about the company and their colleagues during holidays, she said. "They don't take the view that it is sinful to take long vacation."

Iraq masses troops on Kuwaiti border

KUWAIT (AP) — Iraq accused neighboring Kuwait on Tuesday of conspiring to harm its economy and massed tens of thousands of troops and hundreds of tanks on the border. Informed sources in Kuwait said the Iraqi troop buildup had increased over the last 48 hours to at least 30,000, and that more than 200 Soviet-made tanks were posted along Iraq's 100-mile-long southern border with Kuwait. The area of the troop buildup is rich in oil reserves, and has been a source of contention since Kuwait gained its independence from Britain in 1961. The border demarcation has never been agreed on by Iraq, and a portion of it crosses the Rumaila oil field. The same sources said Kuwait on Tuesday reinstated its state of alert, declared July 16 and canceled after three days of tension between the two oil-producing countries. Iraq has 17 million residents, including 1 million troops. Kuwait has 1.8 million residents, and 20,300 members of the armed forces. The U.S. Defense Department, meanwhile, announced that U.S. Navy warships and aircraft were

holding a "short-notice exercise" in the Persian Gulf with the United Arab Emirates, about 600 miles south of the Kuwait-Iraq dispute. The United States has at least seven warships in the Gulf at any given moment. The State Department announced at the beginning of the crisis that it backs Kuwait's territorial integrity. Iraq has accused Kuwait of being an American puppet and of conspiring with the United States to throttle the economy of Iraq, which has the world's second-largest oil reserves but endured a costly war from 1980-88 with Iran. In Washington, U.S. State Department spokeswoman Margaret D. Tutwiler said both Iraq and Kuwait had strengthened their armed forces. "Iraq and others know there is no place for coercion in a civilized world," she said. "All disputes should be handled through peaceful means." Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak flew to Baghdad and Kuwait on Tuesday to meet and mediate the crises with leaders of those countries. Mubarak said his mission was successful, but Iraq downplayed his efforts.

Further investigation revealed the suspect was intoxicated. The officer issued a citation for public intoxication. **CRIMINAL MISCHIEF:** • A security officer discovered the window in room 136 of Crocker Hall had been broken. The resident of the room was informed of the situation. **MISDEMEANOR THEFT:** • Someone removed five fluorescent red 28-inch traffic cones from the northwest end of the runway at the Texas A&M Riverside Campus. • A red and white Huffy 10-speed boy's bicycle was stolen from the Crocker Hall bicycle rack. • A College Station man reported his rust-colored 3-speed bicycle of unknown brand was stolen from the Chemistry Building bicycle rack.

STOP AUTO THEFT!
