From Mozart to Dvorák and from strings to woodwinds — This year's University Chamber Series will provide a diverse range of classical mu-

The series is sponsored by the College of Liberal Arts and the music section of the Department of Philosophy and Humanities.

Traditionally, the Chamber Series consists of five shows performed during the fall and spring semesters. Pianist Lori Sims will kick off the Chamber Series Oct. 1.

This year, however, there will be a special bonus organ recital on Nov. 15 at A&M Methodist Church at Northgate.

Admission is free for the recital featuring John Walker — an established concert organist and music director at The Riverside Church in New York City and chairman of the Organ Department at the Manhattan School of Music.

Walker performs throughout the United States and Europe, and his latest recordings feature compositions by Tournemire, Lesur, Mulet and Dupré.

The Western Arts Trio, consisting of A&M's coordinator of music Werner Rose (piano), David Tomatz (cello) and Brian Hanly (violin), will perform Antonín Dvorák's "F Minor Trio" Nov. 26. Other A&M faculty and guests will be invited to perform.

The Trio is an internationally

popular chamber music group. They perform a wide range of music from traditional works by Beethoven and Brahms to music by many twentieth century composers

This year's Chamber Series will also showcase compositions by A&M's Dr. Peter Lieuwen.

The critically-acclaimed Laurentian String Quartet will perform a Lieuwen piece that has never been played in Bryan-College Station on Feb. 15 in Rudder Forum. The Quartet will also perform works by Mozart, Beethoven and Haydn.

Further, Quintessence, a professional woodwind quintet, has commissioned Lieuwen to write a piece for its March 27 performance. The quintet combines flair and humor into a diversified repertoire of contemporary and traditional music.

The Brazos Symphonetta, an extension of the Brazos Valley Symphony Orchestra, will perform various opera selections by Mozart, including solo arias, duets and quartets Jan 28. BVSO conductor Franz Krueger will conduct.

The all-Mozart performance celebrates Mozart's commemorative year, 1991. The composer died almost 200 years ago in late 1791.

gan in October of 1988. The Sept. 5 performance will be the 52nd Brown Bag show at A&M.

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
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


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
